



From Your Pastor

Thank you again to everyone who made the recent live-streaming fundraiser such a quick success! As is often the case, when you all see the need, you step up to the plate faithfully. Having the equipment and "techs" in place as fall weather comes



is a great insurance policy for us as a congregation. With the fall weather, of course, comes the typical concerns about the flu, and in this year of Covid-19, a second wave or resurgence of the virus is on many minds. Thus, it ought to be a comfort to all of us who care about meeting the spiritual needs of our members that we are now well positioned to ensure that the online experience of worship is as good as possible.


BUT, with this "insurance policy" in place, it is also vital to take a moment and remember the importance of in-person worship. Assuming you're not sick and don't have health concerns which would cause you to avoid public gatherings, here are five (5) excellent reasons, I think, for not forsaking the gathering of ourselves in person for worship.

- ◆ 1) In-person worship reinforces our creatureliness. We are not disembodied spirits, but rather creatures God has made as body and soul. We're not just images on a screen; male and female, we are made in the image of God. God has designed us to interact with the world and one another through our senses of seeing, hearing, feeling, smelling, and tasting. In His gracious condescending toward us, God comes to us in worship in ways that we can experience through our creatureliness. We hear, read, feel, and taste forgiveness in the Word and Sacraments. And if there were any question about the importance of our humanity, remember that Christ redeemed us body and soul. We confess that the body, and not just the soul, will live forever in paradise with our heavenly Father.
- ◆ 2) In-person worship reinforces our identity as the Body of Christ. A body cannot remain vigorous forever when the limbs and various parts are disconnected. The New Testament describes individual Christians as having various talents and gifts meant to be used in service to one another and for the glory of God. Not everyone is an eye, a mouth, or a foot, but we need each other to function as the body. We can certainly hear the Word of God over the internet, join in the hymns and the prayers, and benefit from that, but it's much harder to be of service to one another when we are not gathering together. We each have work to do, which cannot usually be done virtually. In spite of our strong American independent spirit in the civic realm, the Biblical truth is that we need one another to fill in the gaps where each of us is lacking. We need a body

with hands, voice, and smile.

- ◆ 3) In-person worship reinforces the mission of the Church to make disciples of all nations. Every week when we make it a priority to attend worship by actually getting up, washing, dressing, and driving to church, our neighbors and co-workers are watching. When we say no to other activities, like Sunday morning sports or Packer parties, because our first love is to be in the Lord's house, the watching world takes notice. They go through the same challenges, illnesses, and frustrations Christians do. As they see you deal with life, in God's perfect timing they may come to ask you, what is it about your faith in Christ that allows you to navigate through the storm.


- ◆ 4) In-person worship is the only way to enjoy the fullness of the Divine Service. Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper cannot be experienced digitally. We need the Word-soaked water to wash over the body of the baptized. We need the crucified and risen body and blood of our Lord in the bread and the wine to be placed on our lips and tongues. In the Sacraments Christ comes to us in ways that our bodies can apprehend. This is of course the whole thrust of God's dealing with us. In the Garden God went looking for Adam and Eve, and that seeking of His fallen creatures culminated in the very Incarnation of the eternal Son of God, where God Himself took on flesh so that He could relate to us on our own terms but also so that He could take our place on the cross. That incarnational thrust continues in Christian worship.



- ◆ 5) In-person worship is the only way to enjoy the fullness of Christian fellowship. We can't eat donuts and drink coffee over the internet! Neither can we extend the hand of friendship in greeting. Nor can we offer a hug of condolence or a high five of congratulations through our computer screens. Of course, in these Covid-19 days, often we have to be content with an elbow or fist bump, but there is something uniquely warm about being able to greet a brother or sister in Christ, to look them in the eye and smile, even from behind a mask. As the tribe of the baptized we understand one another as fellow forgiven sinners. In the New Testament there are multiple examples of the apostles greeting the churches and urging that we greet one another, remembering our common identity. And that is done best, most fully, in the flesh, face to face.

Sons of Asaph: Nikolai F.S. Grundtvig

*"Grant, then, O God, Your will be done,
That, when the church bells are ringing,
Many in saving faith may come
Where Christ His message is bringing:
'I know My own; My own know Me.
You, not the world, My face shall see.

Of the things to know about Nikolai Frederik Severin Grundtvig, it's worth pointing out that he was a pastor and the son of a pastor, although his relationship with his fellow clergy was often strained in the first half of his adult life. He was born September 8, 1783 in the town of Udby, Denmark, during a time when Denmark ruled Norway. At the age 20 he graduated from the University of Copenhagen with a degree in theology. Nowadays he is considered one of the two most important theologians of 19th century Denmark, alongside Soren Kierkegaard. Hans Christian Anderson's work in children's literature overlapped with them both.

In 1810 when his father fell ill, he asked Nikolai to help him in the church, which he did until 1813 when his dad died, and church authorities would not allow him and his mother to remain in the parsonage. Nikolai's first sermon was entitled "Why has the Lord's Word disappeared from His House?" in which he attacked rationalism and advocated for Lutheran orthodoxy. His attacks on the clergy of his day led him to be ostracized by much of the Danish church leadership. But being a faithful son of Asaph, Grundtvig was an ardent defender of God's Word and felt compelled to openly criticize the church's drifting away from the truth. In an essay entitled, "Polemics and Tolerance," which he read at a gathering of pastors, he told his audience the following:

"Our day has inherited two shibboleths from the eighteenth century: enlightenment and tolerance. By the last of these words most people understand an attitude of superior neutrality toward the opinions of others, even when these opinions concern the highest spiritual welfare of man. Such an attitude has for its premise that good and evil, truth and falsehood are not separate and irreconcilable realities but only different phases of the same question. But every Christian, thoroughly convinced of the antagonism and irreconcilability of truth with falsehood, must inevitably hate and reject such a supposition. If Christianity be true, tolerance toward opinions and teachings denying its truth is nothing but a craven betrayal of both God and man.... There are times when to fight for Christianity may not be an urgent necessity; but that cannot be so in our days when every one of its divine truths is mocked and assailed.... Unless Danish pastors bestir themselves and fight for the restoration of God's word and the Christian faith there will soon be no Christian church in Denmark."

Grundtvig wrote or translated nearly 1500 hymns in the Danish language, only two of which have survived in our Lutheran Service Book: "God's Word Is Our Great Heritage," LSB582, and "Built on the Rock," LSB645. The same two hymns were also included in LW. By comparison, there are 253 in the current Danish Lutheran hymnal! This gives us some idea of how important Grundtvig was in shaping Danish culture and church life. Because of his mother's influence, he retained a lasting interest in ancient Nordic mythology and literature, from which he borrowed for his preaching and hymn compositions.

In addition to serving as a pastor, historian, hymn writer, and leader in the movement for universal Danish education, he was also part of the Danish Constituent Assembly, a group which wrote the first Danish constitution, while holding on to the monarchy, to which Grundtvig was loyal. What is not as well known about this great hymn writer, this son of Asaph,



is that he also served in the nascent Danish parliament for 10 years and before that had campaigned for the abolition of slavery in the Danish Caribbean colonies, now known as the US Virgin Islands. Toward the end of his service in Parliament, he joined in a debate on whether slave owners should be compensated for their loss when the slaves were emancipated. The following is recorded in the parliamentary record:

"The reason why I at this moment call for the attention of the assembly is just that as I too belong to those, who have laboured here the little they were able to, for abolition of the enslavement of negroes in the Danish West Indian islands, I cannot but refute an assertion repeatedly made today, that it should be accepted that it is possible for one man to possess his fellow men with full right of property; against this I protest in my name, and in the name, I should think, of all friends of humanity."

N.F.S. Grundtvig died September 2, 1872, three days shy of his 89th birthday, following many years of being surrounded by friends and supporters of his churchly and educational reforms. The last stanza of his hymn to the Church Bell, captures well his hopes for those who mourned his death:

*"When at last, O Church Bell, thou art tolling
O'er my grave while loved grieve and sigh,
Say to them, their troubled heart consoling,
He is resting with his Lord on high."*

HYMN OF THE MONTH

For over thirty years, a hymn of the month has been taught to the children at Elm Grove Lutheran School. This year, we embark on a new practice of teaching you, the congregation at Elm Grove Lutheran Church, a hymn each month. Beginning this month, a "new" hymn will be presented in each *Seasons* with some background information on the hymn and its author as well as the composer of the hymn tune. This information comes from the Lutheran Service Book Companion To The Hymns. The Lutheran Church has a rich heritage of hymns which cradle-to-grave Lutherans know and love. During the last three decades of the 20th century, the English-speaking world experienced an "explosion" of hymn writing with tens of thousands of hymns being written. A number of superb hymns have come from this myriad of hymns. As a congregation, we have the opportunity to share the "old favorites" and learn some brand new hymns. Each month, the Hymn of the Month will be presented on the first weekend by singing it during the offering at each worship service. The hymn will then be used as a distribution hymn or in another location in the service each weekend of the month thereafter. Let's get started!

The Hymn of the Month for October is LSB 654, Your Kingdom, O God Is My Glorious Treasure.

- 1 Your kingdom, O God, is my glorious treasure,
 My pearl of incomparable worth.
 Its value exceeds every standard of measure,
 Surpassing the wealth of the earth.
 Lord, give me Your grace and the power of the Spirit
 To value this treasure aright
 That, never allured by the world, I inherit
 Your kingdom of glory and light.

- 2 Your kingdom, O God, is alive with the power
 Your Word and Your Spirit bestow.
 Like yeast, they affect the whole measure of flour,
 Enabling Your kingdom to grow.
 Empower me, Lord, as I live Your commission,
 Though humble my service may be,
 And bring every planting to perfect fruition,
 A mustard seed grown to a tree.

- 3 Your kingdom, O God, is a field for the growing
 Of seeds that Your mercy has sown;
 But still in our midst is the enemy sowing
 The weeds that imperil Your own.
 Sustain me, O Lord, till Your day of returning

David Rogner (b. 1960) based this hymn on five of the parables concerning the kingdom of heaven as found in Matthew 13:24-30, 31-32, 33, 44, 45-46. Working through the five parables in reverse order, the first half of each stanza is an exposition on the text and the second half is a prayer based on the exposition. Moving backward through these parables Rogner begins with the immeasurable value of the kingdom and concludes with the joyous hope of the resurrection. The hymn encourages believers and helps to answer the question "How do I understand my place in the kingdom of God?" (Companion to the Hymns, vol.1, pg. 831)

David Rogner serves as professor of English and chair of the English department at Concordia University Chicago. He earned a PhD in English from Loyola University Chicago in 1994 and served as visiting professor at Oak Hill College, London in the fall of 2000. Rogner has written the texts for a number of choral anthems published by Concordia Publishing House, GIA and MorningStar, and his poems have appeared in a variety of publications. Joseph Herl (b. 1959) is the composer of the hymn tune *Glorious Treasure*. Having served as organist, music director, and/or choir director at numerous Lutheran churches, Herl is currently professor of music at Concordia University Nebraska. He served on the Hymnody Committee for LSB and his choral and organ compositions are available from several publishers. (Companion to the Hymns, vol. 2, pg. 397)
