
## Report from Visiting the Light of Christ Lutheran Chinese Mission

Taking the opportunity to go to St. Louis for Pr. McMiller's younger daughter Anna's wedding on Sunday June 13, Pr. Skovgaard and I planned to attend the Sunday service with Dr. Rowold at the Light of Christ Lutheran Chinese Mission of the Immanuel Lutheran Church, Olivette, MO. I then emailed the pastor of the Mission, the Pr. Lim about our intention to come to visit to learn from them, and he was very glad to make arrangements to meet us after the Sunday service. Before the visit, I browsed the Mission's website: <http://www.lightofchristmission.org/> and learned it is a well-established Christian mission with a vibrant Community Service Center.



Yet, the visit still blew my mind. In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, there were about 80 people attending the Lutheran service in the gym that Sunday! All but a couple of them are Chinese from the Mainland, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, though most of them were wearing masks. They were friendly to each other, and a good number of them walked to us to greet and talk to us. The liturgy was bilingual (English and Chinese). The sermon was in English with Chinese translation. This bilingual service enables both English-speaking and Chinese-speaking people, the young and children, the old, and the parents to attend the service together. Standing next to Pr. Lim, there was one who assisted the pastor liturgically and another one who read the scripture. There was a children's message given by a teacher from the school. Sitting in the middle of the congregation, besides the translator there was another one, who led the hymn singing. There was no communion on that Sunday. But people were not dismissed at the closing hymn until guests, notably both

Pr. Skovgaard's family, and my family were welcomed, and guests introduced themselves, followed with brief teaching on stewardship, evangelism, and announcements at the end.

After the service, Pr. Skovgaard and my family stayed over for lunch to talk with, and learn from, Pr. Lim, his wife Yin, and one of the oldest members of the Mission. They told us it was Rev. Shiu-Ming Lau who started the Mission in 2000 after seeing the growing number of Chinese coming to the metro St. Louis. Later it was adopted by the Immanuel Lutheran Church in 2004. In 2006, Rev. Paul Shaw was installed and continued the work until his retirement in 2018. Then, the then already retired Rev. Edmund Lim, was called to serve at the Mission. Another important outreach and growth milestone in the history of the Mission came when they took over the ministry of the St. Louis Chinese Community Service Center in 2012. Now 21 years later they have well over 100 members and dedicated teams for translation, choir, discipleship training, and caring for each other. Currently they have 3 young adults going to the St. Louis Seminary, one man for M.Div, two ladies for deaconess. On Sundays they have Sunday School, Adult Bible Study Class including the Small Catechism in both Chinese and English before the service, and Fellowship Lunch after the service (not the Sunday when we visited). On the other days of each week, they have Prayer Fellowship, Choir Devotion and Rehearsal, Bible Study Fellowship, Senior Fellowship, and Book Study. And their Community Service Center offers various community activities, social services, and consultation.



In summary, it was a great eye-opening and learning trip. Thanks to God who opened my eyes, this visit really encouraged me, and showed me what the EGL Chinese Ministry might look like down the road.




Pastor Tyler McMiller, one of EGL's own, son of Dan and Lisa McMiller, will preach on Sunday, August 1. Pastor McMiller has been called to do mission work in Greece, Bulgaria and Italy, of which, he says Italy will require the most attention. There are 4 men studying to be pastors — all without any Lutheran pastors in the country. He will be the first LCMS pastor ever to be sent to Italy. As Pastor Skovgaard has remarked, this effort will be done "in the shadow of the Vatican." The LCMS, through the internet, and over the past two years (all during a pandemic) has established contacts, and confirmed people in nearly every corner of the county.

Our church has provided funds to help support Pastor McMiller's mission work in SE Europe, for which he expresses his heartfelt gratitude. Please keep this exciting work, and him and his family, in your prayers.

## Pastor Harold Senkbeil celebrates the 50th Anniversary of his Ordination





EGL Members, Jean Kruse and Sherri Bond, attended the 2021 National LWML Convention, June 24-27 in Lexington, KY. The voting body of the convention adopted a \$2,150,000 mission goal for the 2021-2023 biennium. Below are photos, with comments from Jean and Sherri, about their experience at the Convention.



**1** — This is the Mission Walk. We walked 1.5 miles in downtown Lexington, through a park displaying statues of the derby horses. **Donations raised for this event was \$88,417.43.** All for mites!! There were 1100 mission walkers! (Sherri, left, and Jean, on the right)  
**2** — Parade of the country flags. This year there were 82! An increase of 6 from the last convention.  
**3** — Our district flag. There were 40 districts. A member of another zone created this flag. Our district president and both of our young women reps marched in the Parade of Flags.  
**4** — View of the arena from where we sat. **There were 2,787 people who attended the convention.**  
**5** — The fence was in front of the stage. The horse began at the starting line. At the end of the convention he had made it to the "finish" line and "was looking to Jesus!"

# The History, Improvements, and Care of the Elm Grove Lutheran Church Property



On April 11, 1949, the congregation, recognizing that their property on Watertown Plank Road would soon be too small, voted to purchase 5.5 acres at our present church site for \$8,500.

On February 21, 1954, the ground breaking took place for the new church, parsonage, and four classrooms. Later that year, a severe windstorm blew down the newly erected laminated wood arches, resulting in \$20,000 in damages, and delaying progress for several months.

May 8, 1955, brought the dedication service of our beautiful cream brick church with its lannon stone trim.

Early in 1959, the congregation purchased the final parcels of land, 3.8 acres on the south border of the church property and 5.5 acres on the west border at a total cost of \$21,000. This brought the total property to 14.8 acres. In March, plans for the eight-room, \$150,000 addition to the school were approved.

In 1974 construction began on a multipurpose building, including a gym, and wings onto each side of the nave. The chancel wall was moved forward to provide additional church office work space. Later that year, the remodeled church, chancel, office space, gym, and youth center were dedicated.

In November of 1981 the congregation hired the architectural firm of Plunkett, Keymar and Reginato to design an addition. New offices were to be built closer to the school offices. Plans also included updating the chancel area with a lighted wood cross backed by a dossal curtain, a free standing marble altar, marble on the back chancel wall, a new stained glass window, a reredos, a new lectern, and pulpit. The addition and chancel renovation were dedicated October 30, 1983.

In 1996 an addition was built onto the south side, that houses the Christian Life Center, and classrooms.

## Trees



In 2018 funds were provided for trees. Lammscapes Nursery and church volunteers planted the following species:

- 1 Starlight Flowering Crab
- 2 Black Hills Spruce
- 2 Serbian Spruce
- 6 Autumn Blaze Maple
- 2 Littleleaf Linden

There are trees on the property marked with yellow tape, signifying that they need to be removed. The Board of Trustees has received estimates on the related costs and will be making a decision soon. The congregation may be asked for help in the project.

**We use computers for everything. BUT....what happens when your computer is hacked? Here are some simple, yet very important steps you can take to help prevent hackers from accessing your computer and personal information.**

- Back up your information often. You can save your data to a CD, DVD, USB device or an external hard drive. That way, if your computer ever crashes or is hacked, you will not lose all of your information.
- Never give someone remote access to your computer. If you receive a call from someone claiming to be from Microsoft or any other company stating you have a virus or that they can fix other issues on your computer, hang up immediately. Scammers will try to convince you to pay for unnecessary services and get access to your computer to obtain personal information or install malicious software.
- Update your operating system regularly. Computer operating systems are periodically updated to stay current with technology requirements and to fix weak spots that may be targeted by hackers. Install updates to make sure your computer has the latest version. Often there are settings in your operating system to make these updates automatic.
- Use strong passwords and change them often. Do not use the same password for multiple accounts. Use passwords that contain upper and lower case letters, numbers, and symbols. Change your password every three months and do not reuse passwords. This is especially true for passwords that are used to access your email and bank accounts.
- Use two-factor authentication. Two-factor authentication is an added layer of security that combines something you have, a physical token such as a card or a code, with something you know, something memorized such as a personal identification number (PIN) or password.
- Do not click on pop-ups. Pop-up windows on the internet are quick advertising tools, but beware of "too good to be true" offers. Not only can these pop-ups slow your computer and internet speed down, but by clicking on these you can accidentally sign up for unauthorized

services. Set your browser's information bar to not allow pop-ups.

- Be careful what you download. Some of the most destructive viruses have been hidden in internet programs and applications or e-mail attachments. Download only from a trusted source. As for e-mails, never click on links or attachments if you do not recognize the sender. Even if you do know the sender, beware! It is possible their computer was hacked and is sending out infected e-mails. Those emails may also be very well disguised to look like often used financial institutions or retail websites, sent to phish for your personal information.
- Do not send sensitive or private information via email. Email is not usually encrypted, or in other words not in a "secret Computer Protection Tipscode," and can be intercepted and read by hackers.
- Use antivirus software and set it to update itself daily. There are many commercial products that can help you protect your computer from various viruses. Most virus protection software has a feature that will scan downloaded files automatically and some will even scan incoming emails by default.
- Avoid installing unnecessary, unfamiliar, or untested software. This includes games, toolbars or screensavers that could leave your computer open to attacks. Spyware and viruses are often installed by downloading unfamiliar programs. When you install software, choose a program that is not piggybacking other toolbars or software onto the installation. Look for automatically checked box items in the agreement page giving your permission to install these other items.
- Use a personal firewall. A firewall acts as a barrier between you and the internet. It helps keep hackers out and prevents malicious software from sending your personal information to criminals. There are free and retail versions available that come in both software and hardware.
- Be careful of wireless networks. For your home network, make sure your router is password protected. For public wireless access (such as at restaurants, libraries or cafes), be aware if the network is unsecured. Cyber criminals take advantage of unsafe networks to hack into your computer and access your personal data.
- Turn your computer off when not in use. Leaving your computer on and unattended could leave it open for an attack by hackers. Protect your computer, and save energy by turning your computer off when you are not using it.
- Dispose of your old computer safely. Make sure all personal data is removed by the wiping or physical destruction of your computer's hard drive.

If your computer has been hacked and you feel your safety is in jeopardy, or think that the hacker is someone you know, you should call your local police.

Contact a trusted, local computer professional to remove any malicious software that may have been installed.
