From Your Pastor


What a Difference a Year Can Make.

What a difference a year can make. My daughter turned one this past Easter Sunday. She was born on April 17 2021. Two weeks later on April 28 I received the call to come here to Elm Grove at the Call Day service. Two weeks after that, I graduated from Concordia Seminary. Two weeks after that we said farewell to our St. Louis Apartment and moved in with my mom in Sheboygan. However, we moved in with her so that we could help her finish selling her house. Which she did shortly after we arrived. So, we helped her empty her house before we headed to Minnesota to live with Martha's family for a while until we were able to finalize everything with our house in West Allis. Unfortunately, we had some complications which led me to live at a member's house for about a week while my family was in Minnesota, as I started at EGL.

Finally, we were able to close on our house at near the end of July and with the help of some members, we moved in. However, because of our closing, we had to delay the arrival of our possessions. So, we went about two more weeks without the majority of our clothing, furniture, dinnerware, etc. Finally, by August, we had our house, our possessions, we were all in one place, and we were ready to start our life in Wisconsin. And here I sit, in my office, a year out from receiving my call, looking forward to not moving this summer, looking forward to getting to know the saints at EGL better, looking forward

to growing as a father, as a husband, as a teacher, and as a Pastor.

From outside of the church, everything that we went through seems ridiculous. You have a month, from call day to move out day to figure out your life. Through the church, the Holy Spirit decides where you are to go, where you are to serve, and you listen and follow. Through you all, God called me here to be your pastor, to serve you through his Word and Sacraments. God has also called each and every one of you to service. The things that you do are different than the things I do. You do not have a call to be a pastor, but you are called to be a father, a mother, a grandparent, a sibling, a manager, a worker, a teacher, an executive, a church member, etc. God has called you into many vocations. Here is the important part, he has called you into your vocation, to *serve* your neighbor.

To serve those around you no matter what your job is, and that is the difference between how you live your life, and how the world wants you to live your life. Instead of thinking of yourself first, you think of others first. Instead of cutting and running when things get difficult, you acknowledge that God has called you into this place and you try to fulfill your vocation to the best of your ability. Because God has put you there so that you may be a blessing to those around you, so that you may bear witness to his name, and so that his mission, the mission of the church may be accomplished, to seek and save the lost.

Stewardship Message

Our Father in heaven sent His Son, Jesus, to be our Savior. His atoning sacrifice is the first fruits of all the dead, a pleasing aroma to His Father, so that His perfect life and death count for all who believe in Him. He claimed us as His own children in Holy Baptism. He sustains and strengthens our faith with His Holy Word and His Body and Blood.

As new creatures, who have put on Christ, we bear good fruit. We do the good works prepared for us, which He makes known to us in His Word. By faith then, trusting in the Word of God, we do what he says because He does not lie and always keeps His promises. For, "without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him, must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Heb 11:6).

And so the Lord promises: "Honor the Lord with your wealth and with the first fruits of all your produce; then your barn will be filled with plenty, and your vats will be bursting with wine" (Prov. 3: 9-10). How do we honor the Lord with the wealth that God has given us in His generosity? By giving generously to those whom the Lord has

caused us to love, and support your family, your society, and your church. And His promise is that, in doing so, you will never lack.

A common counterpoint is: "But that's from the Old Testament!" Our Lord Jesus Himself gives us similar promises in the New Testament. He says, at the conclusion of the parable of the talents: "For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance" (Matt. 25:29).

And then at the end of the parable of the dishonest manager, he says: "One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful in that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (Luke 16:10-13).

And in His sermon on the mount, he says: "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth

nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matt. 6: 19-21).

We have become conditioned against these promises because of their misuse by the peddlers of the prosperity gospel – the guys on TV who say you can get rich by putting God in your debt. And thus, we miss out on the fact that God does reward temporal faithfulness in temporal matters with temporal blessings. It's no quid pro quo. It's all from God's grace and His fatherly divine goodness and mercy. But those Bible passages do in fact say what they say! It's not the Old Testament's problem. It's ours. It's almost as if we have become jaded against this that we

think it a virtue to be stingy with our offerings.

But our Father in heaven still loves to bless those who bless others. He loves to give to those who give freely and generously. In fact, he challenges us to challenge Him: "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need" (Mal. 3:10).

And so, while we don't give so that we would get, we do receive from the Lord in order to give, and He will bless your giving with more receiving. As St. Paul wrote in Rom. 8:32: "He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?"

ELM GROVE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH MEMORIAL GIFT ACCEPTANCE POLICY

The purpose of this congregation is to assist and support believers as they carry out the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) throughout the world and live the Christian life. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church (EGL), relies on charitable contributions to fulfill this purpose. Charitable contributions also help cover its day-to-day operational expenses. Memorial gifts must support and enhance the purpose of EGL. EGL reserves the right to refuse any gift if accepting the memorial is determined to be in conflict with the Congregation's purpose, or if, in the sole discretion of the Church Council, the gift carries extraneous liabilities that EGL is not able to manage. As an example, a gift of a certain building may involve the need to invest in improvements, pay taxes, deal with tenants, etc.

Every accepted gift will be promptly acknowledged, and donors will be informed of how the memorials will be recognized. Specific requests about acknowledgment will be honored consistent with EGL's practices and policies.

Memorial gifts may be unrestricted or restricted. Gifts that are not restricted will be used toward the general operations as the Church Council may determine.

Gifts may be restricted by the donor for a specific program in the Work Plan. The Work Plan is the annual combined Church / School budget. If someone wishes their memorial to be restricted to a specific use, they are asked to indicate that preference at the time the gift is given and, if others are also giving memorials, they should also indicate that preference. Restricted memorials may be designated to the following general categories:

- Church
- School
- Maintenance
- Music
- Capital Improvements

Thereafter, the Church Council will determine more specifically how the memorial will be used under the category selected.

Please note that only the donor himself may designate a restricted gift. The memorial given by one person cannot later have its designation (restricted or unrestricted) changed by another person, even if by a family member. Likewise, EGL and the EGL Foundation are separate non-profit entities which means that a memorial to one cannot be transferred to the other.

This policy conforms with the best practice of operating non-profit Christian entities. EGL cannot offer tax or legal advice, and the prospective donor is advised to seek his own counsel.

This policy was approved by the Church Council on April 11, 2022.




The Board of Christian Education would like to invite you to a celebration on **Sunday, June 5**, to recognize two very special teachers.




