
From Your Pastor

We have a weed problem in our garden. Well, I suppose garden is a loose term, we have never planted anything there, but at one time the previous owners had a garden there. I can imagine they had some nice flowers, maybe some vegetables, who knows. All I know is that right now there are no flowers just weeds. Last summer, it was full of tiger lilies, and I mean FULL of tiger lilies. It was completely crowded and was spilling out onto my lawn, so my father-in-law and I rented a tiller, and we went through and dug them out. Still, two weeks later they started to pop up again! So, I went through with the shovel and dug them out again. By then it was later in the season, and they seemed to have given up. No more tiger lilies.

However, this spring they came back with a fury, so I went after them with the shovel and dug them up. This time it seems to have done the trick. The lilies seem to have given up. Unfortunately, other weeds have taken their place, a whole plethora of different kinds of weeds have moved into the space and taken over.



There are many different metaphors and parables that the bible uses when talking about sin. More often than not, however, they use a plant metaphor. In many ways the weed problem that I have in my garden is a good metaphor for our life on earth. Sometimes we are dealing with one big sin, one sin that infects our whole life. Then sometimes we are dealing with lots of different little sins. Either way, no matter how many sins we stop from popping up, another one will appear. Just when we think we have our garden in order, just when we have everything working correctly, we take it for granted and sins start to creep in. One sin begets other sins and soon the good things in our lives are being crowded out or killed.

It has destroyed every mistake that you have made, every pit into which you have fallen. Your sins are gone, Jesus has paid your debt and you are forgiven. Your garden is not full of weeds but instead is full of beautiful life which has flowed from the Holy Spirit through the waters of Holy Baptism.

Growing up in rural Iowa, Minnesota, and North Dakota, I actually never knew that we had theologically trained women serving in a broad capacity in the LCMS. When I was 17 and looking at colleges I knew that I wanted to serve in a Christ-centered caring profession. My grandparents asked "Have you ever thought about becoming a deaconess?" and my response was "What's that?" How glad I am that they asked that question! It led me to complete my B.A. in Lay Ministry and Theology at Concordia University Wisconsin and my Graduate Deaconess Certification and M.A. in Religion at Concordia University Chicago. I have served in VA hospital chaplaincy (graduate fieldwork) and two parish Calls prior to serving here at EGL.

My husband Charlie and I live in Germantown with our two children Isaiah and Gabrielle. We are thankful for the warm welcome we received upon becoming members of EGL last year! It is our joy to be a part of God's family in this place.

I will be visiting homebound and hospitalized members, bringing the mercy and love of Christ through listening, building relationship, sharing the Word, and prayer. It is an honor to come alongside our pastors and each of you members at EGL as we care for our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Occasionally you may see me at church or on a visit wearing a navy blue garb, or uniform, with a gold cross insignia on the sleeve. This is the uniform of LCMS deaconesses who belong to the Concordia Deaconess Conference. We wear it as a reminder to ourselves and those we serve that it is the mercy and love of the crucified and risen Christ which motivates and directs our service. She differs from other congregational leaders or volunteers in that she has received formal LCMS education in theology — particularly in the Bible and the Lutheran Confessions — and training in strategies and skills for reaching out to others.


Every congregation includes sick, lonely and marginalized people. Every neighborhood contains those who suffer in body or soul and need to know the love of Christ.

Deaconesses bring a physical presence from the church to those who are suffering. Deaconesses address specific needs within a church and its community, emphasizing that the Triune God works through good times and bad, in both Christians and non-Christians. Through physical aid, teaching, encouragement and other acts of kindness, deaconesses seek to bring the comfort of Christ and the assistance of His Church to those in need.


His note of thanks was in response to a gift of \$4,446 from our Maundy Thursday and Good Friday offerings, given to the synod for support of displaced Ukrainians.

Friendship Library

In 1965 the LWML (Evening Circle) took over the Sunday School "nook" and turned it into a resource center for the congregation. This was first done as a memorial for the Church's 25th anniversary. In 1966-67 the library committee was formed; donations were accepted; and books processed. What started as a simple library cart, operated in the church foyer every Sunday, has turned into a proper library with thousands of books and videos. The LWML embarked on this initial effort with the intention of "passing on our Savior's love through books."

The library continues to be sustained, including the purchase of new volumes, at no cost to Elm Grove Lutheran Church, by the Sunday morning coffee hour donations, as well as by memorials and gifts for the benefit of members and friends of EGL. Currently, Claire Schuppner and Sherri Bond are doing a great job of processing the books that are checked out and maintaining the library. Books, tapes, and other resources donated to the library are screened by the library committee. Final approval of a book is made by the administrative pastor.

1. Fill out the card that is in the book
2. Put the card in the container on the counter.
3. When you return the book, put it in the container.



If you are looking for a specific book, access the card catalog, organized by title, author - it's the "Dewey" system.

One of the significant volumes in our collection is the Ancient Christian Commentary on Scripture.

Happy 100th Birthday to Bernice Krueger McCloskey!

Bernice McCloskey turned 100 on July 18. Her West Milwaukee neighborhood celebrated this milestone with a block party in her honor. Although *Seasons* didn't have an opportunity to interview her, we're thankful to be able to reprint the article below, written by Jane Edgar. It appeared in Bernice's neighborhood newsletter. Bernice has been a member at Elm Grove Lutheran since 1952!

"I just enjoyed my whole life. I always looked forward to the next thing coming. And I enjoyed people." This is from Bernice Krueger who was born on July 18, 1922 and so, is celebrating her 100th birthday this summer. Her parents (father born in 1892 and mother in 1896) purchased their property on Daggett Avenue (now known as 53rd Street) when she was 2 years old. Bernice attended Pershing School along with Walter, a couple classes ahead, who played piano accompaniment to the silent movies after school on Fridays. Walter turned out to be West Milwaukee's famed Liberace!

Bernice graduated from West Milwaukee High School in 1940. After high school she attended MATC for more office classes. After a few months she was hired by M&I Bank in their Trust Department.

Joe was a sailor at Great Lakes Naval Base in 1940. While there, he joined others on a trip to Milwaukee for a dance. It was the same day Bernice came home from a not-so-good fishing trip, so she also went to the dance for some fun. They met, danced, talked a lot, and she invited him over for Sunday dinner. Her mom cooked. In 1943 they were married, and Bernice moved with Joe around the country wherever he was based. Once Joe began to serve on the USS New York, Bernice moved back to West Milwaukee.

Bernice was an active little girl who walked and roller skated all over West Milwaukee and Milwaukee and enjoyed playing at Liberty Park (then known as Lapham Park) and ice skating at Pershing School. She especially liked the swings, slides and teeter-totters. But she also loved checking books out of the library after learning to read early. Her first book was her favorite: *Black Beauty*.

Before her folks had a radio they had a Victrola: "You put the record on, turn the crank and put the needle down." It played 78 rpm records. She loved the song "O Genevieve Sweet Genevieve" and that's what she named her doll. Bernice talks of the old days when coal, ice and milk were all delivered to the home. Many of our Milwaukee bungalows still have the milk chute near the back door. She always knew it was 3:30 a.m. if she heard the clip-clop of Luick's horse who knew every stop for the milk wagon.

Why is she enjoying such longevity? "I've had a great life. I've never been bored."

Bible Study will be offered after the service.


Thursday 6:30 p.m.
