Church in the Glen Luncheon & Fellowship Moves Indoors

A rainy forecast for Sunday, September 11, meant that our annual Church in the Glen worship service and luncheon was held indoors. The rain didn't dampen the efforts and spirit of members who contributed to the meal and stayed to enjoy it. Some grilled hot dogs, burgers and brats. Others provided side dishes and desserts that filled buffet tables with delicious choices for all to enjoy.

From Your Pastor

At the end of this month EGL will celebrate our annual Reformation heritage with a slightly different focus – missions. And truth be told, mission/evangelism goes really well with Reformation! After all, we don't want to hold onto our Reformation roots simply in a librarian sort of way, having our freedom catalogued well. No, the Reformation Christian, the confessional Lutheran, wants others to understand and appreciate the depth of God's Gospel love for His creatures also. Former Synod President Al Barry summed it up well, "Get the message straight, Missouri! Get the message out!"

So, on Thursday evening, Oct 27, during our regular service time of 6:30 p.m. we will celebrate Reformation with appropriate and traditional music and themes, everything you'd expect at a Reformation celebration. Then on Saturday evening, Oct 29, we will enjoy a dinner on site, catered by Revere's in Delafield. A German dancing group will provide entertainment, and our guest preacher for Sunday morning, retired Professor Dr Henry Rowold will give a special presentation on church life and ministry in Communist China, reflecting on a relatively recent trip/experience.


Rowold describes this time in the following way: "As part of a long story, I inherited an opportunity in 2018 to serve a Christian fellowship in southern China. Though it was an English-speaking ministry, the great majority of people were Chinese, most with little background in, but great curiosity about the Christian Gospel. Soon came Covid with its strict lockdown which has hampered gatherings of any kind. The fellowship has continued strong, however, as has the Christian church in all its forms throughout China."



On Sunday morning, Oct 30, Rev Dr Rowold will be our guest preacher and Bible study presenter. During the Bible study hour, Rowold will give a brief glimpse at the long history of Christianity in China. He writes that "by 631 AD a Christian mission sent by the Christian church in Baghdad arrived at the Imperial court in Changan (Xian). Churches and monasteries were built but could not survive a dynastic overthrow. In the 1200s a Mongolian dynasty (Kublai Khan) welcomed the coming of Christianity from a Mongolian tribe. Again, however, Christianity was expelled through another dynastic overthrow. Several centuries later, Christianity came in as an offshoot of European expansion, but this too was suppressed, though smatterings survived underground. Finally, in the early 1800s, a renewed movement from the Western church brought a significant presence to touch all parts of China."

It seems fitting that we should celebrate Reformation and our own EGL involvement in missions this year with a focus on China because of our support for Vicar Sam Lee, who has entered his final year of SMP studies in preparation to be a Lutheran Pastor in The LCMS.

God willing, Dr Lee will be ordained next summer or fall and begin ordained ministry. And to think that EGL has been the garden in which this seed of ministry has grown up! Dr Rowold was one of my favorite profs at Concordia Seminary in St Louis, where he taught Old Testament courses during my time at the seminary. In fact, it was during a course on the prophet Job (of all places!) that I remember coming to a really clear understanding of the Gospel. Dr Rowold will explain more during his time with us, but he spent decades preaching and teaching in the Chinese-speaking world.

Stewardship Message

"Investing for Time and Eternity" is the theme of this year's annual stewardship emphasis. This is based on Matthew 6:20-21 where Jesus said ". . . lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Be honest. When you first saw or heard this year's theme, didn't your thoughts immediately turn to money? After all, that's what "investing" is all about. Right?

As we'll see in various ways throughout this year's program, "investing" **does** involve money. But it's not limited to money. Investing also includes other resources that God has given to us, including time and talents.

Robert G. Lee, a well-known pastor for many years in Memphis, wrote,

If you had a bank that credited your account each morning with \$86,400 that carried no balance from day to day, allowed you to keep no cash in your account, and finally every evening canceled whatever part of the amount you had failed to use during the day, what would you do? Draw out every cent — of course!

Well, you have such a bank, and its name is "Time." Every morning, it credits you with 86,400 seconds. Every night it writes off — as lost — whatever of this you have failed to invest to good purpose. It carries no balances. It allows no overdrafts. Each day, the bank named "Time" opens a new account with you. Each night it burns the records of the day. If you fail to use the day's deposits, the loss is yours.

In other words, when it comes to time, it's use it or lose it! And how we use it determines whether it becomes an investment or is simply used up for this life only. Jesus said we are to seek first God's kingdom and His righteousness. When we use our time to do that, when we make God's work a priority in the use of our time, we are making a wise investment that will pay eternal dividends.

The same is true of the talents, gifts and abilities God has given us. We can figuratively bury them in the sand and

refuse to use them in the Lord's service. That's what happens in many churches and even sometimes in this church. In most churches, regardless of size, 80% of the work is done by 20% of the people. One pastor expressed it so distinctly when he lamented, "As much we could use additional giving from God's people, our greatest problem is not money. We just can't get anybody to do anything."

So "investing for time and eternity" includes how we use our "time" and "talents." It also includes the use of our "treasure." We are managers and stewards, not owners. God owns it all! When we give, we are simply giving back to God that which rightfully belongs to God.

In his excellent essay entitled, "Cost and Worth," Chuck Swindoll wrote,

The difference between handling our money wisely or foolishly is largely determined by the interplay between these two forces. Obviously, we have spent wisely when the cost is eclipsed by the worth. . . That is why, in the long run, we can usually determine a person's scale of values by the things he or she purchases. Or to use the words of Jesus, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

And then he concluded with this powerful presentation:

Think about Sundays — your church life and the motivation you receive. Think about your children and their future. And their children's future. Think about your neighborhood — unreached individuals by the hundreds. Think about the possibilities of radio or television outreach, perhaps a Christian school, enlarged missionary outreaches, room to grow, room to park! What's it worth?

Deciding whether something is worth the cost requires intense, effective, prevailing prayer, as well as the hard work of objective thinking. And then it requires courage to act on God's clear direction.

As you consider your time, your talents and your treasure, will you be one who is "investing for time and eternity" by courageously stepping out by faith in response to God's direction in your life?



The objective of the Elm Grove Lutheran Foundation is to provide resources to enhance, support and encourage the work of God's church here on earth. There are three types of funds: Living Endowment Funds, Capital Funds and Specified Funds. Donations are always welcome. The Foundation Board is made up of 8 elected members, the pastor (s), principal, and the President of the Congregation.

One of the main focuses of the Foundation is Lutheran education. We support the education of those studying to be Lutheran teachers, deaconesses and pastors. In addition, we also are able to support a variety of mission projects both in our congregation and throughout the world.

In 2021, the Foundation supported a number of different projects and dispersed \$79,455.43.

The Foundation supported a number of scholarships for students in Christian education, pre-seminary and seminary. We also supported the St. Philips Mission Society in South Africa, Jonah Burakowski's mission work in Dominican Republic, and the Seminary in Gothenburg, Sweden, which assists training pastors throughout Scandinavia. In addition we provided funds to Journeys Lutheran School, the SMP Vicar program, the Lutheran Heritage Foundation to assist with the printing and distribution of Farsi and Dari language catechisms and children's books for newly arrived Afghan refugees throughout the United States, Doxology, for the production of the magazine Seelsorger, and Rev. Dr. John Saleska Scholarship Endowment to benefit the Pre-Seminary students attending Concordia University Wisconsin.

ARTICLE XIX. ELM GROVE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH FOUNDATION

The Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church Foundation shall be maintained and controlled by the Voters' Assembly of Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church as a corporate entity organized under the laws of the State of Wisconsin and shall be operated by a board of directors, responsible to the members of the Foundation, in accordance with the provisions of its articles of incorporation and corporate bylaws. Any amendments to the articles of incorporation shall be subject to approval by the members of the Foundation.

The purpose of the Foundation shall be to:

- A. Invest and reinvest, manage and control all monies and properties, real and personal, the principal and increase thereof which may be received by the Foundation.
- B. Use said monies and properties for the benefit of Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church of Elm Grove Wisconsin, or for other purposes deemed by its Board of Directors, as defined in its bylaws, to be consistent with the philosophy, purposes, and policies of the Congregation.
- C. Comply, insofar as possible, with the wishes and directions of donor or donors of said monies or properties as declared in the deed or instrument of gift, if any, and
- D. Do all acts and things which will be necessary and/or convenient in the operation of the Foundation, including buying, selling, leasing, exchanging, and dealing in any and all kinds of property, real or personal.

The membership of the Foundation shall consist of all communicant members of the Congregation who have reached the legal voting age of the State of Wisconsin.
