From Your Pastor

Unless the LORD builds the house, those who build it labor in vain. Unless the LORD watches over the city, the watchman stays awake in vain. ² It is in vain that you rise up early and go late to rest, eating the bread of anxious toil; for he gives to his beloved sleep. ³Behold, children are a heritage from the LORD, the fruit of the womb a reward. ⁴ Like arrows in the hand of a warrior are the children^[a] of one's youth. ⁵ Blessed is the man who fills his quiver with them! He shall not be put to shame when he speaks with his enemies in the gate.

Psalm 127 is one of my favorites. At first glance it seems like two random poems, vs. 1-2 and vs. 3-5, thrown together to form a psalm. But the more that you meditate on the Psalm, the more you see the connection between the first and the second half, it's all about the Lord. It's all about Yahweh. Whether it's building a house, guarding a city, or raising a child, unless what you do is centered around the Lord, it's meaningless.

There are few things more universal to humanity than having children. From the very beginning God commanded mankind to be fruitful and multiply. We would like to think that we all want what's best for our children. We want them to get good grades, be successful, have good manners, be well rounded, and be kind.

There is, of course, one big problem with that list. There is nothing in there about our children's relationship with the Lord. We help our kids with their homework, we go to their sporting events, we put them in different extra-curriculars, we bring them to birthday parties, we read them books, but what do we do to nourish their faith? What do we do to make sure that they have a relationship with Jesus? If we are willing to sit at their game for 2 hours, are we willing to read the bible and talk to them about it for 30 minutes?

In school here at EGL, I can easily tell the difference between the kids

who spend time in the word with their parents or grandparents and those who don't. As a pastor, the children who obviously spend time in the word with their parents and know Jesus are a joy to my heart. They are truly arrows in this pastor's quiver. However I find myself thinking about and praying more for those who do not. What an amazing blessing and opportunity we have here at EGL to bring Jesus to children who do not hear about him from their parents!

Maybe you don't have any children. Maybe your children have children of their own. God has put you in the position that you are in so that you can nourish the faith of your grandchildren and your nieces or nephews. Maybe you don't have any of those relationships, again, God has placed you here at EGL, where you get the chance to nourish children's faith through the simple act of placing your offering in the plate or giving online. Maybe that connection hasn't been made in your mind before. The money that you give helps contribute to a teacher's salary or to my salary, which allows us to take the opportunity to have those conversations with kids and to tell them about Jesus' love for them.

Children are a heritage from the Lord. They carry their families' heritage, and the children that this congregation cares for, both members and non-members, will be our heritage. What an amazing blessing and opportunity to care for children that God has given us!

Richard Wurmbrand, the founder of The Voice of the Martyrs (VOM).

You can find the magazine on display in the Friendship Library. Wurmbrand was born into a Jewish family in Bucharest, Romania, on March 24, 1909. In 1938 through the witness of Christian Wolfkes, a Romanian Christian carpenter, Richard and his wife Sabina were baptized and became Christian, joining the Anglican Mission to the Jews. He was later ordained, first as an Anglican, and then later, after World War II, as a Lutheran. He was arrested several times for preaching the Gospel against the orders of the Communist authorities. Eventually in 1964 he and Sabina were allowed to leave the country, following Norwegian church efforts to secure his release. He initially didn't want to leave but underground church leaders convinced him to become a voice for the persecuted church in the West. The going rate for purchasing a prisoner's release at that time was \$1,900. His price was \$10,000. He eventually made his way to the United States, where in May 1966 he testified before the US Senate Internal Security Subcommittee. He famously removed his shirt and showed the scars on his body from his beatings and tortures. He died on February 17, 2001, and is buried in the Rose Hills Memorial Park in Whittier, California. - ECS

Zoya was first placed in a home for children whom enjoyment and good careers, none of which are to be

the government thought needed "re-education." Refusing to part with the cross pendant her mother had given her just before being taken away, Zoya tightened the cord of her necklace at night to prevent Communist authorities from taking it.

As a result of her stubbornness, she was sent to a home for developmentally disabled children, where she continued the fight for her cross and the Savior it symbolized. When other children encouraged her to

blaspheme and steal, she replied, "My mother should not children. Instead of giving them riches and recreation, have a criminal child."

Sentenced to death at age 14, Zoya's punishment was later reduced to a long imprisonment. Her parents and brothers had long since been freed while she remained in prison.

When we read in the Bible that blessings are promised to *faith in Christ. After their release, they sought ways to serve* children of the faithful, some of us expect a good position persecuted Christians and, in 1967, founded The Voice of the at work, a happy marriage, academic success or some position of honor. But the Bible often defines "blessing" another way. The Lord Jesus said, "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when others revile of the Martyrs magazine. "Materials provided by Voice of you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against the Martyrs, PO BOX 443, Bartlesville, OK, 74006. 800-747you falsely on my account." (Matthew 5:11)

But what we should desire most for them is that they must remember our family members like Zoya Leshcheva "as though in prison with them" (Hebrews 13:3).

Do you wish for your children earthly possessions, fun,

entirely despised? Or do you think primarily about preparing them for the highest blessing - to become, like Zoya and thousands of others, partakers of Christ's Passion? It is not enough to take children to Sunday School and church or to have devotions with them in the home. They must come to understand what is means to be a Christian, a cross bearer who views suffering with Christ as pure joy.

Obey the Word of God and prepare real blessings for your prepare them to endure sufferings gladly while sharing in the sorrows of Christ. There is no higher blessing than this. This is the path to glory.

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
