From Your Pastor

Acts for Easter

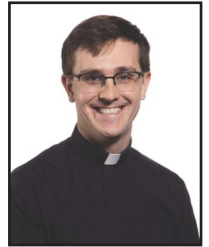
As we begin the month of May, you will notice that in church we set aside our readings from the Old Testament and instead have a reading from the book of Acts. The book of Acts does not easily fit into our traditional structure of the lectionary. Typically, each week we are given an Old Testament reading, a reading from one of the Gospels, and a reading from an epistle. The book of Acts, however, is not an epistle, nor is it from the Old Testament, nor is it a Gospel.

The books of the Old Testament are narratives which center around the work of God amongst his chosen people. First with Adam and Eve and their descendants leading to Noah, and then to Abraham and his descendants. The epistles are letters written to Christians around the ancient world. Their purpose is to convict them in their sin, instruct them in the way they are to go, and to comfort them with the Gospel. The Gospels are also narratives which center around the work of God, in and through Jesus Christ, among his chosen people. So where does Acts fit?

The first thing that happens in the book of Acts is Jesus appearing to his disciples and re-teaching them for 40 days everything he taught them during his three years of ministry followed quickly by Jesus' ascension into heaven. However the book actually begins with a prologue, or an introduction, that gives one the impression that this is actually a book written to a man named Theophilus. Some debate exists as to whether or not Theophilus was a person or if the name, which in Greek means lover of god, represents the Christian church.

The book of Acts is largely a narrative and has been attributed to Luke by the vast majority of Christians since the second century. The narrative of Acts begins with Jesus' 40 day teaching session, goes to his ascension, and moves quickly into the life of the early church. However, two men stick out from the rest of those mentioned in the book, Peter and Paul. The vast majority of the book follows these two men as they grapple with their new life as followers of Christ. Both Peter and Paul struggle with the wedding of their Jewish customs and their new life set apart from the law of Moses.

Although Acts focuses on the life and ministry of those two men, it deals with how God interacts with his chosen people much like he does in the Old Testament. His chosen people, however, are no longer the biological children of Israel. The book of Acts teaches us that God does not claim his children because of their heritage or anything that is intrinsic to man. Instead, God claims people through the faith that he gives them.

God has claimed us through the faith that he has given us in our baptisms. We who are not the biological children of Israel, God has claimed as his own. He did it through water and the word, through our parents and our pastors. This is how God claims people in Acts, and it is how he claims us today. Through our baptisms and the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we too have been raised to a new life. This is why we read Acts during Easter: to remember the Gospel proclamation of the forgiveness of sins which was spread out to the whole world; the proclamation that began from the resurrected mouth of Christ, continued through the mouths of the apostles, and continues to go out to the world through our mouths.

May 14 is Confirmation and First Communion Sunday, in addition to Mothers' Day. What a great gift for Christian mothers to see their children confirmed in their baptismal faith and to receive with them for the first time the Lord's body and blood in the Sacrament! We must be intentional about raising up our children to confess and to "own" the faith. Let Deuteronomy 6:4-7 guide your thinking and your actions. "Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up."

You can live out that command in many ways, including: doing devotions frequently, not just during Advent and Lent; actually praying with your kids about the things that concern them; reciting and discussing the Small Catechism as you drive around (thus, redeeming the time); reflecting together on the movies you watch or the TV news reports you hear; taking your job as a baptismal sponsor seriously; encouraging young people to volunteer around the church; encouraging them to research the topics that interest them and thus to defend the faith in their daily lives; and by discussing the sermon/service on the way home from church or over lunch/dinner.

Our children are "in" the world – there's no avoiding that; but they don't need to be "of" the world. Regardless of what our young people grow up to do, they are first and foremost baptized children of God. They are precious in His sight!

The evening group of LWML will meet in the Friendship Library on Monday, May 8 at 6:30 p.m. The mission project is putting together more hygiene kits for the **Gifts of the Heart** to be brought to the National LWML Convention in June.

As I am writing this, I want to share some insights with you of the **Heart to Heart Sisters of All Nations Event** that took place on April 15. Vicar Sam and Rose Lee had a beautiful display of Chinese culture as they interacted with those in attendance. The Worship Service was very inspiring. The Hmong Children's Choir was just precious. Prayers were spoken in English, Hmong, Chinese, and German. The luncheon consisted of ethnic and American food. During the program, there was a random drawing of names for various prizes. To our surprise, Sherri Bond and I had our names drawn and were presented with little gifts.

Give all thanks and praise to God! All 28 Mission Grants of National LWML have been fully funded for a total amount of \$2,211,976.00. There are 40 LWML Districts making up the National LWML. Each of

the districts sends 25% of their mite donations to the National LWML and uses 75% of its mite donations for funding District Mission Grants. The mite donations to National LWML exceeded the money needed for the Mission Grants by \$9,200.00 at the end of the fiscal year in March 2023. This money will be rolled over for the upcoming biennium of 2023-2025. As a person thinks about the giving of mites to LWML, most of the mites are given as pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters. This

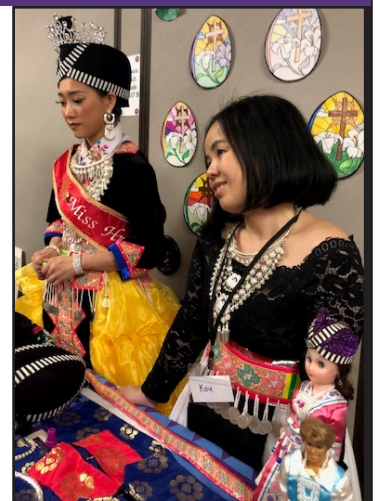
Chapel service at St. Paul Lutheran Hmong Language School

Money from this grant will continue this mission and expand into other districts with large Hmong populations.

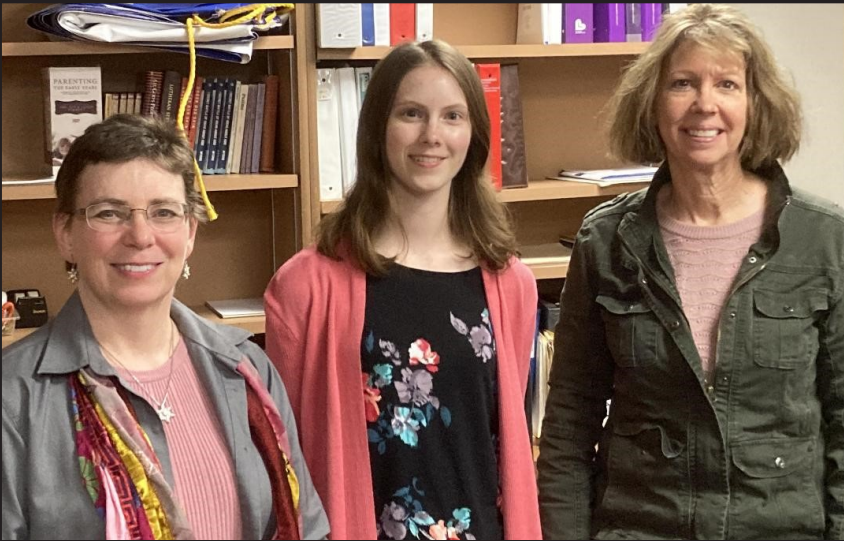
Heart to Heart Sisters of All Nations Event

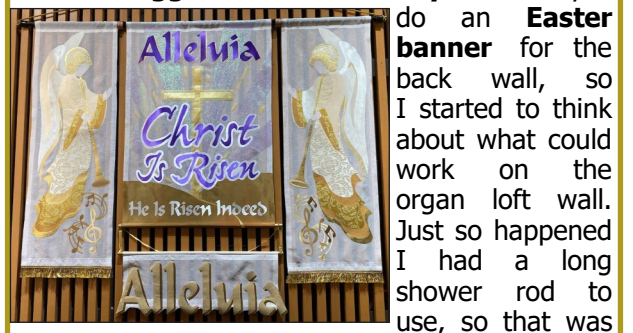

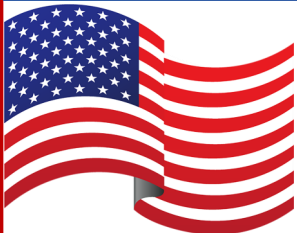
