

# From Your Pastor

From now until the end of September, the lectionary in the Epistle reading will be going through much of the book of Romans. Romans is a letter written by Paul, probably sometime around 55 AD likely during his third missionary journey to the fledgling church in Rome. Paul had been traveling around for almost 20 years, preaching the Gospel and teaching people about Jesus. He has been planting churches and encouraging new churches.

This missionary activity made Paul an enemy of the Jewish authorities all over the Middle East, Before he finished his journey in Jerusalem, it was prophesied that Paul would be put in chains there. Paul finishes his third missionary journey in chains, however it would not be the chains of the Jewish authorities, it would be in Roman chains. Paul would be saved from the Jews by the Romans. The Romans would not release Paul, instead they would take him into their custody, and give him a trial as a Roman Citizen. Eventually Paul would be taken out of Jerusalem and to Caesarea, a Roman port city. In Caesarea, Paul would appeal to Caesar and would therefore be taken to Rome to visit the fledgling church to whom he had written.

The book of Romans has a very important place in Lutheran theology. The book of Romans is one of the most, if not the most, quoted or referenced book of the Bible in the Book of Concord. Luther had to say this about it in his preface to Romans:

"This Epistle is really the chief part of the New Testament and the very purest Gospel, and is worthy not only that every Christian should know it word for word, by heart,

but occupy himself with it every day, as the daily bread of the soul. It can never be read or pondered too much, and the more it is dealt with the more precious it becomes, and the better it tastes."


Not only will we be reading most of the Epistle in church, but during Bible study each week we will be going through the Epistle in detail. Worship, and therefore Pastor Reseburg the reception of the Sacrament, is just



one part of our life as Christians. It is the foundation. Attending Bible study, led by a pastor, is also another vital part of our life together as the church. Not because the pastor has such a great gift of knowledge, but rather because it is a chance for believers to interact with the Bible together. Bible study gives us a chance to ask questions, to hear different perspectives, to challenge ourselves, and to grow in our knowledge of God's Word together.

Ted Kober, one of the founding members of Ambassadors of Reconciliation, has to say this in his book Built on the

Rock: The Healthy Congregation, "...I find one common characteristic among highly conflicted churches: they have too few people, including leaders, in God's Word. The healthy churches I encounter benefit from larger percentages of regular people in Bible study." (pg. 13) If we desire to be a healthy congregation, then attending Bible study together is a great place to start! Bible




# 68th Regular Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod

July 29-Aug. 3 at the Wisconsin Center, downtown Milwaukee

"For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing," St. Paul wrote to the Corinthians. And indeed, it is pure folly to the eyes of the world. Who would believe that a dead man hanging on a tree redeems the world? It seems even more outrageous when you learn that same man is God incarnate. Indeed, it seems folly to the world, "but to us who are being saved it is the power of God" (1 Cor. 1:18)

The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison was re-elected president of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod on the first ballot after receiving 52.32% of votes cast and surpassing the required majority needed to win, the LCMS Office of the Secretary announced on June 21.



The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) will gather in convention to discuss and perform the work of the church. Delegates will elect officers, debate and vote on resolutions, gather for worship, study God's Word and more.

The theme chosen for the convention is "We Preach Christ Crucified," from 1 Corinthians 1. This central message will inform delegates as they discuss vital matters related to the Concordia University System, church fellowship, providing pastors for LCMS congregations and other matters necessary to the operation of the church.

The national convention is open to the public, and public seating will be available in the hall behind the convention delegates. Large screens will be available to view convention proceedings.

Guests may visit exhibitors in the Exhibit Hall, attend opening worship on Saturday night, July 29, and enjoy the many evening events. There is no fee for visitors or guests.

#### **BASIC LUTHERANISM**

Law & Gospel. \*\* The founder of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod explains to 19th-century seminary students how to properly distinguish the Law and the Gospel and how to preach them so as to bring sinners to Christ. This book offers both stimulating theology as it lays out the distinctive Lutheran approach to Scripture and comforting devotional reading as it plumbs the depths of what (Friendship Library has several Commentaries.) Christ has done for us. (230.41 WAL)

#### **BIOGRAPHIES OF MARTIN LUTHER**

Roland Bainton. Here I Stand: A Life of Martin Luther.\* This is an acknowledged masterpiece of the art of biography compelling, easy-to-read and insightful into Luther's tumultuous life and times. (260.6 Bai)

Martin Brecht. Martin Luther. 3 vols.\*\* This exhaustive multivolume treatment is the definitive scholarly biography of Lu-

Heiko Oberman. Luther: Man Between God and the Devil.\*\*\* A deep psychological and spiritual treatment of Luther.

#### THE CONFESSIONS

The Book of Concord. As the definitive authority in all things Lutheran, this book is in a category by itself. The creeds and the catechisms\*; the Lutheran Confessions of faith (Augsburg, Smalcald Articles, Formula of Concord, Treatise on the Primacy of the Pope)\*\*; the extended defenses of those Confessions (the Apology of the Augsburg Confession and the Thorough Declaration of the Formula of Concord\*\*\*. #### **WORKS BY MARTIN LUTHER**

Gene Veith. Spirituality of the Cross: The Way of the First The Freedom of the Christian.\*\* This early work by the Relays the groundwork for Luther's doctrine of vocation. This Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." And it teaches how we are to be "little Christs to each other."

> Letters of Spiritual Counsel.\* Here we see Luther's pastoral heart, as he offers spiritual counsel to ordinary Christians of his day who struggle with some of the same issues that we do today.

> Commentaries.\*\* Luther's theology is drawn from the Bible, so his Bible commentaries are some of his profoundest works. Two good places to start are his Commentary on Galatians, which is a sustained critique of works righteousness, and his Commentary on Romans, whose explanation of justification by grace through faith led to the conversion of John Bunyan and John Wesley. His commentaries on the Psalms make rich devotional reading and his multi-volume Commentary on Genesis contains, among other things, a thorough treatment of vocation and the Christian's life in the world.

Bondage of the Will.\*\*\* This full-throated argument against Bo Giertz. The Hammer of God.\* This is a novel by a Swedish the humanism of the Renaissance genius Erasmus is considered some of Luther's greatest theological writing, but it is not for the faint of heart.

#### **DEVOTIONAL WRITINGS**

John Kleinig. Grace upon Grace: Spirituality for Today.\* An exhilarating, paradigm-shifting book that can reinvigorate the reader's devotional life. It shows how prayer, Bible reading, meditation, worship, daily devotions and the Christian life are animated by the grace of God, the workings of the Holy Spirit and the presence of Christ.

Harold L. Senkbeil. *Dying to Live: The Power of Forgiveness.*\* This book explores the struggles of daily life in light of our fundamental problems of sin and death, but it goes on to show how life can be transformed by the forgiveness bestowed by Christ in His Word and Sacraments. (248.4 SEN)

Scot Kinnaman, ed. *Treasury of Daily Prayer*.\* This superb resource for daily devotions includes for each day of the week a Psalm, an Old Testament Reading, a New Testament Reading, a writing by a prominent figure in the historical church, a hymn verse and a prayer. In addition, it includes the Daily Offices, the Small Catechism, an array of worship services, more prayers and other devotional helps.

Johann Gerhard. Meditations on Divine Mercy and Sacred Meditations.\*\*\* This great 17th-century Lutheran author had the insights of a theologian, the sensitivity of a pastor and the words of a poet. These books, the first of which was translated by LCMS President Matthew Harrison, are a fine entry into the riches of the Lutheran devotional tradition.
