From Your Pastor

Consider this article just an update on a number of items.

Worship Schedule: Reflecting on the experience last summer and this one, the Board of Elders decided to continue with the summer worship schedule of Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. and Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m. The Elders recognize that it's hard to please everyone with their preferred worship time, but they felt strongly that the benefit of worshipping together as a larger community outweighed offering two separate Sunday morning worship services. The Thursday evening service will continue alternating between a Communion Service and a Prayer Office. Because only one service is being offered on Sunday morning, the Sacrament will be offered at every service on Sunday mornings. This is consistent with our Confessions that the Sacrament be offered every Sunday and feast day.

Leadership Retreat: For the first time in many years the elected leadership of the congregation came together on Saturday, Aug 12, for a half-day retreat at Schoenstatt in Waukesha. The goal was to study and reflect on the responsibilities and privileges of serving Christ and His Church in various roles. Another goal was to engage in a Biblical study of personal peacemaking, making use of Ambassadors of Reconciliation material. Mark Ewert, Laura Traas, and John Wolck gave great presentations.


Outdoor Service: The Board of Elders at the Aug 12 leadership retreat decided to hold the annual outdoor service/Church in the Glen on Sunday, Sept 10, at 9:00 a.m. A luncheon, combining a catered meal and shared dishes, will be served afterwards. During the service the Board of Evangelism will welcome new members. There will also be a childrens' message.

School: Space here does not allow for a thorough explanation of all that has happened, but please know that, following the special Voters' Assembly decisions on June 25, an agreement was drafted and signed with Zion Lutheran Church in Menomonee Falls that allows our school space to continue providing a Christian education. The school located at EGL will be managed by Zion under this arrangement. As you can imagine your Board of Christian Education has been hard at work this summer making preparations, and for the sake of good communication, please direct any questions you might have regarding school matters to them.

Vicar Sam Lee: In mid-August Dr Samuel Lee finished his four-year SMP studies through Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN. He will receive a call from the South Wisconsin District to serve in campus ministry at Calvary Lutheran Chapel on the campus of the University of Wisconsin – Madison, which is the oldest LCMS student ministry in the nation. He and his wife Rose will eventually

relocate to the Madison area, but before that happens he will be ordained and installed here in the congregation that nurtured and supported him through the years. That date is Sunday afternoon, Nov 19.

Fall Bible Studies: The midweek Tuesday and Wednesday morning Bible studies will resume on September 12 and 13, respectively.





Pr Reseburg will take over the leadership of the Tuesday morning ladies study with an initial focus on various hymns. Thanks to Vicar Lee for his work over the last couple of years! Pr Skovgaard will continue leading the Wednesday morning study, but with a switch in focus. After two years of diving deeply into Church History [from the end of the Book of Acts nearly to the outbreak of the Reformation], we will now return ad fontes to the Book of Acts, seeking to appreciate how all the letters of Paul fit together in the growth of the Church. Both classes run from 10:00-11:00. On Sunday morning, Sept 17, a new Sunday School year will begin for the children. On Sept 24 a new adult study will run for 6 weeks, entitled "Blessed Are the Peacemakers." This is another Ambassadors of Reconciliation resource, aimed at helping us individually apply the Biblical lessons of forgiveness and reconciliation to our vocations at home, in the office, and at church.

Synod Convention: From July 29 to August 3 The LCMS met in convention in Milwaukee. Although EGL did not have an active pastoral or lay delegate in the convention, our own Mr Richard Ewert was the organist for the opening service on Saturday night, July 29. EGL also had two candidates running for office, but unfortunately neither was not elected. Altar and pulpit fellowship was declared with Lutheran churches in Sudan, Finland, Uganda, Ukraine, and Sri Lanka, as The LCMS expands its cooperation with churches around the world. While these were causes for celebration, it is sad to note that we had to break fellowship with the Japan Lutheran Church over their continued insistence on ordaining women into the Pastoral Office, against the clear Word of God. Elections were held for any number of offices, including the Concordia University-Wisconsin Board of Regents. It was a great joy to hear from Lutheran leaders in Finland as they encouraged us to be faithful in difficult times. As they suffer unjustly for the sake of Christ, they had the faith to view their trials under government oppression as a blessing! Resolutions that passed included the disciplining of Concordia University-Texas for their attempt to break out from under the authority of the Synod. Another resolution that passed upheld the beauty and dignity of receiving the Lord's Supper in person, and thus rejected the practice of "online communing." Comfort for the Grieving

Solomon, the Qoheleth in Ecclesiastes, reminds us that

there is a season for everything under the sun, "a time to be born, and a time to die." With that in mind, how can we best care for those who are grieving the death of loved ones? Everyone grieves differently and for different periods of time, but we can draw much comfort from 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, as the apostle Paul urges us to encourage one another with the hope we have in Christ.

In a very real sense the whole New Testament is written to new believers, to those who were struggling with living out the Christian faith as pilorims in a strange land. But in particular, how should these relatively new Christians in Thessalonika deal with the death of loved ones? Their pagan neighbors lived by the creed of eat, drink, and be merry for tomorrow you die. Their lives began in nothingness and ended the same way, so there wasn't much meaning in

God's glory, there's no hope. But not for the Christian! The Christian knows he was created in the image of God, and by faith is being molded into the image of Christ already in this life, and will by the grace of God live eternally with the Triune God.

Grieving of course is nothing new to the human experience. Job mourned the loss of his children, his wealth, and his health. Jacob mourned for Joseph. David mourned for Absalom. Mary and Martha mourned for Lazarus. Even Jesus wept for his friend Lazarus. To grieve is an expression of love. The difference between the Christian and the unbeliever, however, is that we do not mourn as those who have no hope. That's what Paul tells the Thessalonian Christians as they mourned the death of friends and family in that first generation of believers. You have hope!

How do we dig deeply into that hope? By remembering a couple of points from the text. One, Paul reminds them/us that Christ died and rose again. The perfect Son of God was born of the virgin Mary precisely to make atonement for our sins, which he did on Good Friday. But that wasn't the end of the matter. He didn't just die; he was also raised for our justification, and ascended to the right hand of the Father, where he continues to intercede for us. In the waters of Holy Baptism we were united to that death and resurrection, so that where Christ is, we will one day be also.

Next Paul tells the grieving Thessalonians the dead in Christ are asleep in Jesus. They are at peace. Even in death they are united with Christ. Paul told the Romans

that nothing in all creation, not even death, can separate



between. Without a destiny in Grave marker for Eston Hemings Jefferson in Madison

us from the love of God found only in Christ. The souls of the blessed dead are with the Lord, while their bodies await the resurrection. Death cannot sever the relationship Christ has with his beloved. In fact, the old order of things has passed away for them. For the blessed dead, there is no longer any suffering, crying, or pain. We can almost envy them that peace!

Piling on the reasons for hope, Paul teaches the grieving that the dead in Christ will rise first when the Lord returns. They won't miss out on anything simply because they died and went on ahead of us. We rightly mourn their absence because someone we loved has been taken from our presence, and there's a big hole now. But when we are resurrected on the last day, we will be reunited with them because we will be caught up in the air with them and meet Christ together. And this reunion won't be a temporary meeting, but we will

always be with the Lord, as he once again walks with us in the cool of the evening in the new creation.

It is ordained for man to die once and then be judged, so we don't pray for the dead. But we can and ought to pray to God, giving thanks for those we loved, especially for those who taught us the faith in word and deed. We thank God not only for giving them to us to love but also for the hope we have in Christ of seeing and living with them forever.

So, how do we mourn as those who have hope? By remembering that by the grace of God we are in Christ who lived, died, and rose again for us and our salvation. Because we are in him now, we will also be with him forever, along with all those who died before us in Christ. Where he is, we will be also. To live is Christ, and to die is gain. This is what it means for us to be the church. Death has lost its power over us because of the hope we have in the resurrection.

In conclusion, how might we best prepare those who will one day mourn our death? This is where the rubber meets the road in our Christian lives. Live now in such a way that they know where your hope is placed. Our hope is not in our good-natured charity and generosity; not in our moral rectitude; not in our genealogy; not in our superior minds. But rather in the One who said he was going ahead to prepare a place for us, so that where he is, we can be also.

Sunday Mornings at EGL take the opportunity after the service to sip a coffee, tea or juice, taste a sweet treat, and enjoy fellowship with members and guests before Bible Study or Sunday School.

John and Luanne Schaefer, pictured below, are the hosts who keep this vital weekly occasion to caffeinate, nibble, and socialize going. Every Saturday they are in the library, setting up the coffee urns that get plugged in first thing on Sunday to start brewing. They make sure there is always coffee, cream, juice, and some treats for children on hand. And, we all rely on the gracious servers who volunteer to pour coffee and bring/serve treats, bought or home-baked.



Orphan Grain Train is a Christian volunteer network that ships donated food, clothing, medical and other needed items to people in 71 different countries including the USA. ogt.org



SAS is a collaborative effort across the Synod to equip congregations and church leaders in identifying, catechizing, encouraging and supporting boys, girls, men and women for ordained and commissioned church work vocations.
