Lent begins this year on February 14 with Ash Wednesday and so does our emphasis on Moses' book called Exodus. In it Moses asks Pharaoh to let God's people go seven times, and Pharaoh finally does it. When he does, God's salvation is so amazing that the event becomes the Gospel of the Old Testament. The Old Testament Scriptures mention the Exodus 125 times! Throughout the book of Exodus God reveals who he is through his absence and his presence, through his silence and his speech, through his wrath and his mercy, and through his judgment and his amazing grace. In so doing, the book paints a beautiful portrait of Jesus. Under the theme of "Let My People Go," we will look closely at 10 different passages in Exodus in which we find God at work rescuing His people.

From Your Pastor

(This is a summary of my sermon from the 2nd Sunday after Epiphany, urging us to take seriously the need for young men and women to consider church work.)

1 Sam 3 introduces us to Samuel as a young man, probably in his teenage years. But if you remember your Bible history, his birth is an answer to prayer. His mother Hannah is one of two wives of the man Elkanah. The other wife, Peninah, is hard on Hannah for being barren. Apparently she mocks Hannah relentlessly, until one day Hannah is praying at the tabernacle at Shiloh. She must've been praying fervently because Eli sees her and thinks that she is drunk.

In any case, Hannah vows that if God will give her a son, she will dedicate his life in service to God. God answers her prayer; therefore, she names her son Samuel – God hears. Once she has finished weaning him, probably at 3-4 years old, she gives him to Eli to serve at the tabernacle. We know that she and her husband are pious because they come every year to the tabernacle and bring young Samuel a new robe to wear. Some ten years have proba-

bly passed and Samuel is a teenager as we meet him in chapter 3, sleeping in the tabernacle.

3x times Samuel wakes up to the sound of someone calling him, thinking it is Eli. After those 3x, it is Eli, to his credit, who figures out that God is the one calling the young man and tells him how to respond faithfully – Speak Lord, for your servant is listening. Great words for all of us to pray! However, once Samuel returns to his bed and once again hears God calling out to him, the text says something interesting. We read that "the LORD came and stood, calling out." We have a pre-incarnate vision of the Son of God standing near young Samuel. When Samuel is called, he can see the Word calling him!

The same God continues to call men into the pastoral office today, and men and women into the teaching ministry, the diaconal ministry, and into various forms of missionary service. We know from Scripture that it is God's desire that all people repent and believe in Christ. But for that to happen, someone has to be called and sent. As St Paul writes in Romans 10, "For everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. How then will they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching? And how are they to preach unless they are sent?" We see Paul's logic here. When preachers are sent, people hear the message that allows them to believe, and then call upon the One who saves. But if preachers are not sent, people won't hear the Gospel which allows them to believe and be saved.

So, that brings us to an effort that the Synod has embarked on, Set Apart To Serve. This effort is aimed at encouraging men and women to hear the Lord's Word, calling them into service as church workers. If you've been involved in the life of any congregation, you'll realize that church work is often hard and frustrating at times. What compels your church workers to keep going, however, is the goal of one more soul hearing the Gospel and being saved. That makes it all worthwhile — to know that you are an

instrument for the revealing of the glory of God, all for the sake of saving souls. Honestly, does it get any better than that? To know that your work is making an eternal difference in the lives of others?

The Synod has embarked on this effort because it's the right thing to do but also because the numbers are scary. The man in charge of Set Apart to Serve, the Rev Dr James Baneck, reports that enrollment at both seminaries

is down 60% in the last 5 years. 60%. Let that sink in. At a time when ½ of all LCMS pastors are 55 or older, and many baby boomers will retire in the next few years, that's when our enrollment numbers at the seminaries are dropping. And the numbers of those studying to be teachers, principals, deaconesses, church musicians and organists are even worse! How do we expect unbelievers to hear and believe

and thus be saved, if we don't actually send anyone out to proclaim the glory of God in the person of Jesus Christ?!

But raising up the next generation of pastors is not just on the young men in our church. Let's ask some questions of ourselves. Does the Church create an atmosphere of love and support for her workers? Do we put stumbling blocks or hurdles in the way of the Spirit moving in the lives of our young people? Do we cultivate the idea that serving God and His people is profoundly rewarding and worthy of our dedication? Do we nurture young men and women, in whom the Spirit is moving, being patient and encouraging them as they grow?

All of these questions are easily summed up in one question: What do you hope your children will grow up to be and to do? Other professions and vocations are of course worthy, but if you wouldn't be deeply honored and prepared to sacrifice like Hannah did with Samuel to see your son or daughter enter into church work, you've lost sight of Epiphany! As a community we ought to be looking for and prepared to support them as they wrestle with the Spirit's call into ministry. We ought to teach them to pray for listening ears and to realize that being a servant of God is the most rewarding job possible, even when frustrating at times.

Christ teaches us that the harvest is vast, and that we should pray to the Father for more laborers in the vineyard. If you and I treasure the gift of faith that saves and the forgiveness that God pours out abundantly in His Word and Sacraments, then out of compassion for the next generation in the church and for our neighbors, we ought to gladly promote church work among our youth as something worthy of their best years and energy! God's good and gracious will be done! Amen.

You don't have to go to Africa for mission work to get a "thumbs up" or "way to go" from God. Stewardship includes simple gifts such as a husband loving his wife because she is a gift from God. A mom feeding her baby in the middle of the night because she has been given this new life. A child doing their absolute best because their talents are gifts from God.

Simple gifts have been entrusted to you and stewardship happens every day. You have been doing it. It is your faithful presence in worship, your generosity for the Gospel, the investment in your family with the message of the Gospel and so many other gracious and ordinary efforts. These are all stewardship.

The Father was well pleased with Jesus because of what



He had done (Luke 3:21-22) and what He was going to do. The same is true of you, faithful steward. He is pleased with what you have done and what He knows you will do. He knows you will heed His Word and answer His call. He has given you all the grace you need to be His faithful steward. With you He is well pleased. Ref: lcms.org/stewardship

Congregation Gathers for an Update from the Governance Committee



by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." (Romans 15:13)

Church members were invited to attend one of two Town Halls in January to hear an update from the Governance Committee. One of the findings by the Ambassadors of Reconciliation, as outlined in their December 2022 report, was to "Over the long-term (two to four years), consider reviewing and changing your governance model." The nine-person Governance Committee was formed and has determined that the current constitution and bylaws need updating. They've been meeting to consider the pros and cons of different options. Their research and deliberations have led them to endorse a "single board governing structure." Comparing it to a "set of nested bowls" with the largest bowl representing the voters' assembly, it also integrates the work and responsibilities of a Board of Directors, a Committee of Elders, Pastor(s) and an Executive. Their good work will continue, as will their updates to the congregation.



The morning group of LWML will meet on Wednesday, February 7 in the BAAC at 10:00 a.m. The Bible study, "Where is Your Treasure? found on pages 20-21 of the winter issue of *Lutheran Woman's Quarterly* is based on Matthew 6:21, "For where

on Matthew 6:21, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." The study is divided into 5 parts for our discussion: A Look at Biblical Stewardship; Stewardship – Love in Action; Stewardship is Discipleship; Stewardship in Action; and Stewardship and Treasure. At the meeting, there will be a handout of a synopsis of the events in Nehemiah 1-8, in regard to stewardship. If you have time before the meeting, you may like to read these chapters.

On December 16, 2023, President Cinda Poppe; Vice President of Special Focus Ministries and Mission Grants, LuAnn Roman; and Treasurer Patty Silah presented a \$20,000 check to fully fund the SOS Center Mission Grant #11 to Lydia Beasley, the Executive Director of SOS. This grant will be used to start a new program, **Designed for Success**, to effectively reach high school youth. We see how our contribution of mites is being used to promote special programs within our South Wisconsin District. Praise the Lord.

Good news from the National LWML! Journeys Lutheran School received the fully funded Grant #3 of \$100,000. High school students at Journeys Lutheran School are able to enroll in the School-to-Work Internship Program by taking elective classes at Martin Luther High School. This National Grant will allow for the purchase of two vans for transportation between Journeys Lutheran School and Martin Lutheran High School.

a few items of care and comfort and take it to one of these members?



Did You Know If you're feeling stressed, reading a good book can lower your cortisol levels and other unhealthy stress hormones by 68%. Researchers from the University of Sussex found that stress reduction can be achieved within six minutes of reading. They also found that reading reduces stress better than other methods such as listening to music (61% reduction), drinking tea or coffee (54% reduction), or going for a walk (42% reduction). Research-

ers believe the concentration of reading a good book helps distract the brain away from anxious and stressful thoughts, which reduces heart rate and muscle tension caused by stress. (Ed. of beta-carotene which is converted into vitamin A to support




Vitamin A also




