Urnes Stave Church

The wooden church of Urnes (the stavkirke) stands in the natural setting of Sogn og Fjordane. It was built in the 12th and 13th centuries and is an outstanding example of traditional Scandinavian wooden architecture. It brings together traces of Celtic art, Viking traditions and Romanesque spatial structures. Urnes is one of the oldest and is an outstanding representative of the stave churches.

The stave churches constitute one of the most elaborate and technologically advanced types of wooden construction that existed in North-Western Europe during the Middle Ages. The churches were built on the classic basilica plan, but entirely of wood. The roof frames were lined with boards and the roof itself covered with shingles in accordance with construction techniques which were widespread in Scandinavian countries. Among the roughly 1,300 medieval stave churches indexed, 28 are preserved in Norway today.

From Your Pastor

February 19 was a huge day in the life of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. However, for most of us the day probably passed without much notice. The day before was the anniversary of Martin Luther's death, but only in an indirect way were that Sunday and Monday connected. This past February 19 was the 50th anniversary year of the St Louis Seminex walkout. On that day the vast majority of students and faculty left their classrooms on the campus of Concordia Seminary-St Louis, never to return again. The word "seminex" therefore refers to the **sem**inary that went **into ex**ile.

The initial, public reason was to show solidarity with the president of the seminary, Dr John Tietjen, who had been relieved of his duties and responsibilities the previous month. Hundreds of congregations and pastors would eventually leave the Synod in the months and years ahead. It's hard to overestimate the repercussions that 1974 had on the whole Church. A new Synod would be formed which would then lead other Synods into the formation of the ELCA. In fact, those who left with Seminex were the leaders and drivers behind that effort. Even for those who stayed, or returned, there were many scars as the Church was left to lick her wounds and chart a course forward. There was a seminary to rebuild and a trust to regain throughout the LCMS world.

As a boy at that time, growing up out east, I really had no awareness of that cataclysmic event. In fact, over the following years I don't remember my childhood Pastor ever mentioning it in a public setting. My parents certainly didn't talk about it over the dinner table or with friends who came for Bible study. The first time I remember hearing about it was when I arrived at the St Louis Seminary to begin my Greek studies in the summer of 1996. It seemed like news to most of my classmates as we talked in hushed tones about what had happened.

Over the years of service in the Church, I have come to realize that the real issue around which Seminex revolved was our understanding of the Word of God. Without a doubt, many who were involved were caught up in the great personality struggles of the day. One is reminded of the African expression that "when the elephants fight, the grass gets trampled." But once the dust settled and folks saw more clearly what the issues were, it truly was about our confession of the Word of God.

That's where the connection with the season of Lent and Martin Luther is found. The First Sunday in Lent had us hear about the temptation that Jesus endured in the wilderness after fasting for 40 days. No sooner had Jesus been baptized and heard the Father declare, "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" than we find

Jesus in the desert hearing Satan tempt Him with these words, "If you are the Son of the God, turn these stones into bread." The first temptation Jesus has thrown at him is the same temptation Adam and Eve get: Did God really say? Satan is always seeking to throw doubt into our minds about the trustworthiness of Scripture.

Where Adam and Eve failed, Jesus succeeded. However, Satan continues with that same line of attack against us even today. The spiritual stakes are high. If Satan can get us to doubt the reliability and efficaciousness of the Word of God in one area, then the door gets opened elsewhere also. If creation didn't happen in six normal days; if the fall into sin didn't happen and thus death has always been there; if the flood was not a global deluge; then maybe the incarnation of God the Son in the womb of the Virgin Mary didn't happen either; then maybe the resurrection is simply a metaphor for the memory of good people living on beyond their deaths. Maybe that business about God loving us from eternity is all bunk too?

Truly, sometimes God's Word is hard to understand. Hard, because sometimes we're not sure what it's actually saying. Hard, other times because we don't like what is all too clear. But at the end of the day, if we can't say "This is the Word of the Lord," "Thanks be to God," then doubt has crept in. Then all manner of mischief becomes possible. If we are not created and born as male and female, complementary to one another and designed for heterosexual marriage, then the LGBTQ+ agenda is the way to go. If there's no such thing as sin, then there's no objective need for forgiveness either. Suddenly forensic justification goes right out the window too.

With Luther, whose death we remembered on Feb 18, let's fight the good fight in our day also by holding fast to God's Word. Don't let the camel's nose of doubt slip into the tent! Luther at the Diet of Worms confessed before the medieval Church's and the empire's leadership that his conscience was held captive to the Word of God. That conviction gave him the encouragement to do the Reformation work God had placed in his hands to do. That's a great example for us too!







But when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) he entered once for all into the holy places, not by means of the blood of goats and calves but by means of his own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls, and the sprinkling of defiled persons with the ashes of a heifer, sanctify for the purification of the flesh, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God. Therefore he is the mediator of a new covenant, so that those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance, since a death has occurred that redeems them from the transgressions committed under the first covenant. (Hebrews 9:11-15)
