

Above all, dear God, speed the course of Your Gospel among us, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit, hearts are turned to that freedom from sin and death that You alone graciously give through Jesus Christ. From Your Pastor

A number of years ago President George Bush introduced to the larger public the doctrine of pre-emptive war – attacking the enemy before he has the opportunity to inflict harm on the U.S. Well, in the wake of the annual celebration of Father's Day, the prophet Job gives us some insight into what might be called pre-emptive fatherhood when we read in chapter one, verse 5: "When a period of feasting had run its course, Job would send and have them [his children] purified. Early in the morning he would sacrifice a burnt offering for each of them, thinking, 'Perhaps my children have sinned and cursed God in their hearts.' This was Job's regular custom."

It was Job's regular practice to anticipate the sins of his children, to make sure they attended worship, and to offer up the sacrifice of prayer for his children. This was an ingrained habit for the patriarch Job. May the LORD grant

us, Christian men and fathers, an equal measure of such pre-emptive fatherhood. The Church needs fathers who will exercise this sort of biblical masculinity, not giving into the temptation of simply being liked by their children, but who will stand their ground and confess with Joshua, "as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

And we should do this because big consequences are at stake. What will it profit your children to gain the world in terms


of education and leisure opportunities if they lose their souls?

A beloved hymn from bygone days puts it this way: "Oh, blest the parents who give heed Unto their children's foremost need

And weary not of care or cost. May none to them and heav'n be lost!" (LSB 862, stanza 2)

Just two months ago our youth confirmands bound themselves to the Apostles' Creed, in the same way all of us have, and in so doing exhibited virtue, ie manliness. They stepped forward in faith, confessing that the Triune God is the beginning and the end of everything. Christian men and fathers, do not let them become disillusioned because by our habits we confess something different. It is easy to

be a martyr – to go out in a blaze of glory. It is significantly more difficult to model pre-emptive fatherhood by daily dying to sin and rising again in faith. As St Paul puts it so well in Romans 12: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship."

Twenty-five some years ago the Swiss Government published a report on which religious influences contributed the most to the passing on of faith from one generation to another. The conclusion of this report was that the piety of the father – his beliefs and practice of those beliefs – is the overwhelming influence on the transmission of the faith. If a man's children perceive that Church is central to him, they will conclude that Christian faithfulness is part and parcel of what it means to be an adult. If Tony Dungy of the Indianapolis Colts could identify before the watch-

ing world that his Christian faith was more important to him than his ethnicity as the first black coach to win the Super Bowl, then certainly we Christian men can exercise intentional, pre-emptive Biblical

masculinity within our families and within the Church by letting our children know by word and deed that faith in Christ trumps everything the world considers important.

Let your children see you praying and praying for them. Let them know that in

making decisions about where to live and work, the location of a solid, faithful congregation in which to worship is crucial. Don't just warn your sons against drugs; urge them to treasure godly women as future wives. Likewise, model for your daughters what they should look for in a Christian man. Let them see you fight to preserve a difficult marriage rather than divorcing easily. Let them know that you are strong enough to confess your sins. Give your children fully caffeinated Christianity! You want them to "catch the bug," not get inoculated against it.

Brothers, the time we have to teach and pass on the faith is brief. When that time is up, let Christ find us standing at our post!



SPRING BREAK MISSION TRIP 2024 Peace Lutheran Campus Center

IN THE CITY THAT NEVER SLEEPS

During their time in Stevens Point, students of Peace Lutheran Campus Center have the opportunity to participate on mission trips during academic recesses. This spring break 2024, a mission team traveled to New York City. The group was blessed to be hosted by Pastor Johnson Rethinasamy and Immanuel Lutheran Church in Queens, NY.

From the start of the trip, the students were challenged to embody the city's nickname: The City That Never Sleeps. A 10 PM arrival into LaGaurdia Airport plus an unfavorable time zone change made for a difficult awakening the next morning. An early start was required to travel to the Bronx for a day of volunteering at the Atlantic District's Festival of Workshops. The team assisted with registration, parking, and serving refreshments while pastors and lay leaders received respite from their busy lives by attending various breakout sessions.

Through His Word, God encourages, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). God shared His rest with the team and the congregation Sunday morning while attending services in both English and Mandarin Chinese. The group endeavored to spread this rest by canvassing throughout the church's neighborhood, inviting community members to come to church. That evening, the hustle and bustle of New York City was personally experienced in Times Square. Here, students took turns praying for others, praying that they may receive God's peace and rest among other things.

During the remainder of the week, the Peace mission team saw evidence of how God relieves our burdens and provides reprieve. The parsonage, which Pastor Johnson would be moving into soon, was painted to make it feel like home, a place where he could relax after long days ministering to others. At Immanuel Lutheran Church and another local church, students literally carried heavy loads as they moved furniture, reorganized spaces, and cleaned

out storage closets, relieving the congregations of those burdens. While visiting the 9/11 Museum and Memorial, it was clear how God worked through others to tend and provide for impacted people in the aftermath of that tragedy. The group led a morning chapel service for Martin Luther School, a nearby middle and high school, during which the message reminded them that God watches over us and that no one is too small in His eyes.

By the end of the trip, the mission team was tired after a week in The City That Never Sleeps. But even though we need rest, we know that "[The LORD] who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep" (Psalm 121:3-4).



In addition to this trip to New York City, Peace Lutheran Campus Center has taken mission teams to Orlando, Baltimore, Los Angeles, and Birmingham in the last several years. Mission efforts have included activities like construction (dry walling, painting, sealing a roof), serving at homeless shelters and food pantries, and ESL (English as a Second Language) classes. Pastor Johnson Rethinasamy will again be hosting a student mission team from Peace in January 2025, as they serve his hometown congregation in India! 


