

On Sunday, August 17, Trinity Lutheran Classical High School held its opening service for the 2025–26 school year.


From Your Pastor

In his book, *Life Together*, Dietrich Bonhoeffer explores a simple yet profound truth: our fellowship as believers is a gift, a gift possible through and in our Lord Jesus. This fellowship in Christ is certainly on display in our worship, as we gather corporately around the gifts of God, received and shared. However, Bonhoeffer also gives attention to the mutual conversation and consolation of the brethren, where one believer brings Christ to another, especially in times of loneliness and hardship. As he says, "visitor and visited in loneliness recognize in each other the Christ who is present in the body; they receive and meet each other as one meets the Lord, in reverence, humility, and joy." Just as our Lord Jesus tabernacled among us in his incarnation [John 1:14], so he calls his Church to live incarnationally, coming alongside one another and speaking his to live incarnationally. As we begin our first year hosting forgiveness, life, and salvation into their lives and specific Trinity Lutheran Classical High School, as we begin another situations. The one who bore our burdens calls us to bear year of ministry here and in our community, we get to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith.

Over the last few months, I've learned a lot about living incarnationally from how much we've received as a family. In our time of physical and spiritual need, so many people came out of the woodwork to come alongside us and bear our burdens, from the support of so many family and friends to your gracious welcome and hospitality as we received.

The first example came from a nurse Simeon had for several days in the NICU. As with all of Simeon's nurses, she was very knowledgeable about Simeon's care and very personable. But, that's not what stuck out the most to us as Simeon's caregivers. What stood out the most was her persistence. Even on days where she was assigned to other babies on the floor, she would stop to check in on Simeon and us. She would go above and beyond to help us feel supported and prayed for in this difficult time. She would play with Lily when specialists came in to talk with us so our attention wouldn't be divided. A week or so after

Simeon's surgery, she came in to see how he did and offhandedly said "I was hoping to come pray with you guys the day of his surgery but I broke my back." She taught me how to live incarnationally.

pictures from EGL's Call Night watch party and a note expressing EGL's excitement to have us come be a part of the EGL family, signed by those who had attended the party. This note arrived to us at an overwhelming time in Simeon's NICU stay and was so meaningful to us. A small but incredibly powerful gesture of Christian welcome and fellowship. You taught me how to live incarnationally.

Saints of EGL, we have so many opportunities right now one another's burdens, share one another's joys, and lift come alongside our members, our students and staff, and one another up as we walk, ever focused on our Lord our community with a message that the world cannot offer and does not understand. We get to bear one another's burdens and point others to Christ Jesus in the midst of joyful and troubling times. When we live incarnationally, we point the world to Jesus, our incarnate, crucified, risen, and ascended Lord. What better purpose could we have in this life than that?

"So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort arrived at EGL. But, I figured I'd take the space here to from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and share two specific instances of incarnational living we've sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:1-8).



Elm Grove Lutheran Church Welcomes Rev. Bienfait Safari-Romeo



On Sunday, August 17 during the Bible Study hour, Rev. Bienfait Safari-Romeo told the captivating story of God's grace at work in his life. Orphaned in a tragic act of terrorism at the tender age of ten, Bienfait grew up in war-torn Democratic Republic of Congo, ultimately was forced to flee with other Congolese, then made his way to Lutheran Theological Seminary in Tshwane (LTS) in suburban Pretoria, South Africa, where Pastor Skovgaard was among the many professors who prepared him for the ministry. EGL has provided monetary support, together with other U.S. donors. Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne has awarded him a full scholarship for the Master of Arts in Religion degree; he begins his studies in September. Pr. Bienfait speaks fifteen languages. He learned English only five years ago and has written three books in English to date and is working on a fourth. His inspiring story is of how God turned a national and personal tragedy into an avenue for gospel proclamation and kingdom growth. Pr. Bienfait has been called to serve a church in the Rwamwania Refugee Camp in western Uganda where he will minister to his fellow Congolese in their native tribal languages. Many of his colleagues in South Africa and Uganda have recognized his extraordinary gifts in theology and communication skills and have expressed the hope that he may one day serve as a professor in their seminaries to train young men to minister faithfully to congregations in a wide range of African countries. He will bring Gospel consolation to countless people who've fled their homeland to seek safety from marauding armies and rioters to gain a secure future in this world and the next.

Brother Ass

What Shall We Make of the Human Body?

Pity the human body. Alternately coddled or ignored down through the centuries, the body has survived millennia of abuse and misuse, adulation and degradation. But only barely.

People have expended millions of dollars and gallons of sweat in obsessive pursuit of the <u>body beautiful</u>. Guys and gals sign on for months of exhausting regimens to sculpt their skin, muscles, and sinews into a close approximation of the classic ideal of the perfect Adonis or Venus.

Sadly, however, people don't seem to know what to make of their flesh. Recently, the body has become an impediment—a useful tool to project one's ego, perhaps, but fundamentally not much more than an avatar of a virtual self that somehow seems more real than the flesh and bone you're born with. Or shall I say, "born into"?

That's the latest insult suffered by the body. <u>Transgender</u> ideologies have kids and parents scratching their heads over whether they may have accidentally been saddled with the wrong one. So-called experts have convinced those who feel more like a boy than a girl, or vice versa, that the sexed body is an obstacle to true freedom. Puberty blockers, hormone therapy, and extensive surgical procedures will fix that, they hold. So healthy human organs are surgically amputated, and artificial approximations of alternate genitals are constructed to enable youths and adults to ensure their preferred pronouns and bodies match—or nearly so.

So what should we make of the body?

A Body at Which Angels Wonder

Francis of Assisi, more earthy and direct than most of us, affectionately called his body "brother ass," likening it to that humble beast of burden that cheerfully plods along, bearing its load without complaint. He saw the lowly mortal body as a mere container for the immortal soul.

The Bible, on the other hand, sees the <u>body/soul</u> continuum as one cohesive unit, the result of God's creation of our first parents from the dust of the earth plus his life-giving Spirit. Though these sexed bodies of ours do eventually wear out and die, they'll one day be restored and resurrected into never-ending life.

The Devil and his minions have no comprehension of what it's like to exist in three dimensions in this material universe. Angels are pure spirits, so they "long to look" into the astonishing wonder at the center of salvation (1 Pet. 1:12). They long to see how at one point in human history, God the Son—the eternal Word of the Father—left his throne in glory and descended to become a zygote within the uterus of a lowly virgin in Nazareth. They strain to see how he was born in helpless infant flesh and suckled at his mother's breast like all other babies do.

Our hope in time and in eternity is rooted in this human flesh of Jesus, who is simultaneously God and man. The mind-blowing truth is that in him, the whole fullness of the godhead dwells bodily (Col. 2:9).

Bodies. Precious and Precarious

Tragically, many in our time treat the body as an expendable nuisance. Convinced they're trapped in their bodies, they want out.

I get their frustration. I'm in my 78th year of life *[now 80th]*, and I've always been happy with my male body and all its unique features. Riffing on Rodgers and Hammerstein's celebration of female sensuality in *Flower Drum Song*, I rather enjoy being a boy. Jane and I had the pleasure (let the reader understand) of bringing three wonderful human beings into the world and through them now four grandchildren, with the prospect of other generations yet to make an appearance in an unknown future.

But lately, my body has been playing tricks on me. The sexual reciprocity my late wife and I enjoyed has long receded into the rearview mirror. Though there are seven people who can trace their origins to our union, youthful vigor is now a fond memory.

I've discovered that embodied life is precious and precarious. In 2021, after 14 months of home hospice care and three days of precipitous decline, Jane died in my arms. Three years ago, I came within half an hour of <u>death</u> myself, gasping for breath after blood clots suddenly took up residence in my lungs. Reality therapy, that was. I'm getting used to the fact that there will come a time when this body of mine will return to the dust of the earth and my spirit will return to God who gave it.

Bodies Who Long for Resurrection

Solomon puts the whole matter in perspective: "Remember also your Creator in the days of your youth, before the evil days come and the years draw near of which you will say, 'I have no pleasure in them" (Eccl. 12:1).

I was <u>in print</u> not long ago bragging about wanting to be a spry old man. But then I suffered a retracted torn ligament; now I'm hobbling around with a cane and looking at foot fusion surgery and a three-month recovery window. It'll leave me with a greatly diminished gait. No matter. By the grace of God, I am who I am. I serve my Lord Christ in the <u>diminished body</u> I still have and with all the energy he supplies. No, I'm not what I once was physically. But I'm not what I will be either.

On that day when Christ returns and raises all the dead, he will give to me and all believers eternal life in both body and soul. On that day, we'll hear Jesus exclaim, "Behold, I am making all things new!" (Rev. 21:5). Then, even this old "brother ass" that has carried me so faithfully all these years will be remade in glory to be like his own risen body. Thanks be to God!

2025 LCMS Youth Gathering — Benjamin Ewert

The 2025 LCMS Youth Gathering has come and gone, and I was blessed to be a part of it thanks to EGL! This year's tri-annual gathering took place in New Orleans, July 19–23, with the theme ENDURE from Hebrews 12:1-3. Over 20,000 Lutherans gathered for five days of worship, fellowship, service, and time in God's Word.

Kickoff in New Orleans

My journey began in Milwaukee on July 18. After a weather delay in Washington, D.C., I arrived in New Orleans late that night—alongside three other youth groups on my flights.

The next morning, I checked in at the New Orleans Convention Center as part of Team Flex, a group of volunteers ages 18+ who assist throughout the Gathering. (This year, the oldest volunteer was nearly 80!)

For lunch, I joined the South Wisconsin District Youth Event at Mulate's. We enjoyed jambalaya, shrimp, chicken, pasta, and bread pudding before participating in a photo scavenger hunt with our District President, Rev. Nathan Meador.

Serving and Exploring

As a Team Flex volunteer, I worked shifts helping at information desks and assisting participants at the Superdome. On Sunday, I was treated to lunch from Forged by Fire, a nonprofit serving jambalaya with either chicken or pork.

Between shifts, I explored the Interactive Floor, which included Concordia universities, servant events, comfort dogs, and more. I even reconnected with former EGL pastor Aaron Reseburg, now serving Good Shepherd–Watertown.

Mass Events at the Superdome

Each evening thousands gathered in the Superdome for worship, music, and messages centered on ENDURE. Our hosts were Tanner Olson (CUW grad), Pastor Brady Finnern, and Shelly Schwalm. The Gathering Band opened every night with the theme song, and Tanner Olson read a new poem every night.

On Night 2, Lutheran rapper Flame shared this reminder: "You don't endure by willpower—you endure because Jesus is holding onto you. You are loved by the Father, led by the Spirit, and you belong to Jesus."

He then led a high-energy Mass Event Plus concert that had the Superdome chanting: "Ain't no party like a Lutheran party!"

Though I had returned home, the Night 3 Mass Event featured Rend Collective as the Mass Event Plus performer, leading youth in joyful worship.

For Night 4, Bethany Hamilton encouraged youth with her testimony: "God doesn't say life will be perfect, but He does say His grace is sufficient for us."

Takeaways

At Wednesday's Closing Divine Service, President Matthew Harrison urged youth to consider church work vocations: "I need a thousand of you to stand up to the call and go do it." **Are you one of the 1,000?**

Even in my short time at the Gathering, I saw how God is working in today's LCMS youth. The church's future is bright.

The Parable of the Lost Sheep
