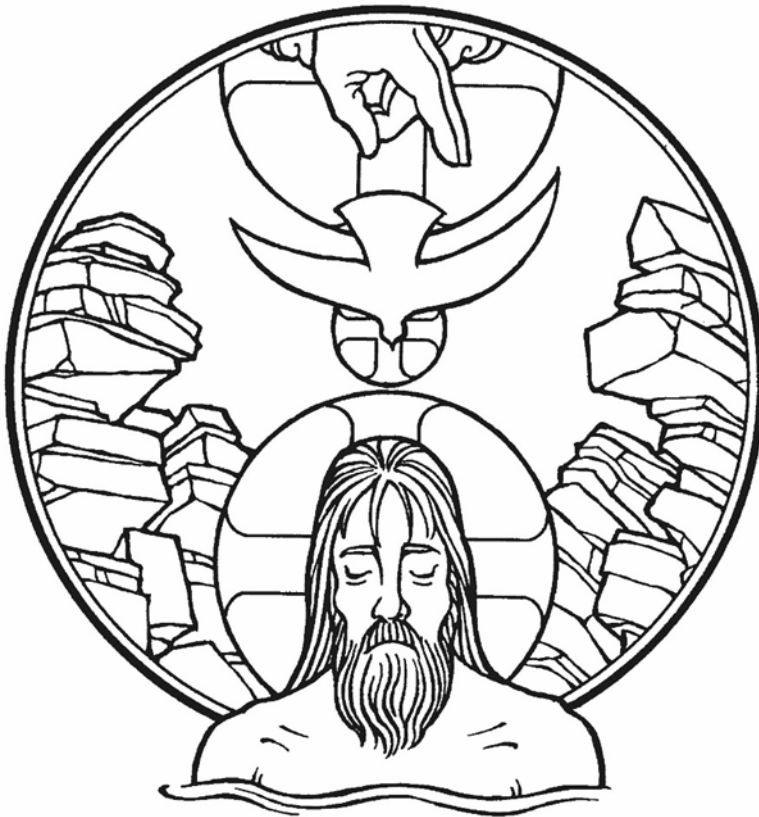

The Lord's Supper is celebrated here in the glad confidence that those who commune actually eat and drink the true Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in, with, and under the bread and the wine. EGL in the Word (The Baptism of Our Lord)

Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 42:1-9

This is the first of four Servant Songs in the book of Isaiah (42:1-9; 49:1-6; 50:4-9; 52:13-53:12), detailing what Yahweh's chosen Servant will accomplish in light of Israel's failure to be a beacon of light to the nations. These songs form the structure of Isaiah 40-55, a jump from the Babylonian threat of Isaiah 1-39 to the future return from exile in Isaiah 40 and following. This Servant will be anointed with the Spirit and well-pleasing to His Father (sound like a certain baptism, anyone?). This Servant will bring justice, especially to those who are downtrodden (bruised reeds and faintly burning wicks, the blind and the prisoners). The Creator of all things has given this Servant to his people as a covenant, and we do well to think of Jesus' use of the word "covenant" when describing the Lord's Supper ("take and drink; this is the new covenant in my blood"). We see the anointing of this Servant in Matthew 3:13-17 (Jesus' baptism).

Psalms: Psalm 29

We can think of Psalm 29 as an extended commentary on Isaiah 42:5. God is the Creator and Sustainer of all things (and no one else!). He is enthroned above all things and therefore has control over them all, even the threatening waves and mighty forests. The references to Lebanon, Sirion, and the wilderness of Kadesh likely emphasize the range of Yahweh's dominion (from far north of Israel [Syria] to far south [Mt. Sinai]), as well as Yahweh's ability to make even the strongest mountains shake and skip! And the response? God's people ascribe glory and strength to God alone and seek His strength and blessing.

Epistle: Romans 6:1-11

Romans 1-8 is a tight-knit train of thought. The gospel is the power of God for salvation for all who believe in faith (1:1-17). All have fallen short of God's glory (1:18-3:20). All are justified by Christ as a gift (3:21-3:31). Faith in Christ makes people true children of Abraham, giving lasting peace and undoing the sin and death that came from Adam (ch. 4-5). And here, Paul teaches us that baptism gives us this gift of faith and all that faith holds on to: Jesus' death and resurrection. Baptism is not simply a symbolic ritual; it kills us and makes us alive. We walk in newness of life, springing to eternal life, despite what our Old Adam and broken world can throw our way (ch. 7-8).

Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17

Why did Jesus need to be baptized? That's the big question many of us ask as we ponder these words. John certainly thinks he shouldn't need to be. And yet, Jesus says: "Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness" (3:15). Clearly, this desire to be baptized is in accordance with the Father's will: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (3:17). For here, Jesus steps into a river flooded with sin so that he might be anointed for his task as the sin-bearer. He takes those sins from the river and immediately goes into the wilderness to be tempted by Satan, undoing the errors of Israel before him. He who will be declared as the "Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" next weekend does that very thing today, marching from the river through the wilderness to the cross, where those sins will be crucified with his body and righteousness will be fulfilled and freely given to all who trust in him. next weekend does that very thing today, marching from the river through the wilderness to the cross, where those sins will be crucified with his body and righteousness will be fulfilled and freely given to all who trust in him.

Questions for Reflection This Week

Monday: The first Servant Song focuses on bringing justice to the downtrodden. Who is someone in your life who would benefit from hearing of a Savior who comes to give encouragement, justice, and hope to those who are downtrodden, discouraged, and empty?

Tuesday: What does it look like in our daily lives to ascribe glory to God (Psalm 29)?

Wednesday: What is a recurring or past sin in your life that burdens your conscience? Pray about this sin today, reading once again Romans 6:1-11.

Thursday: In our gospel this week, John doesn't understand why Jesus needs to be baptized, yet does it anyway. Are there any things about God that you don't understand, either from what you read in the Bible or what you've experienced in life? How can we, like John, trust Him even in the midst of misunderstanding and uncertainty?

Friday: Matthew tells us that God is well-pleased with his Son Jesus. Why is he so well-pleased? What does this tell us about the heart of God?
