From Your Pastor

Another celebration of the Reformation is just around the corner. In His grace God has given us another year to remember the rediscovery and proclamation of the Gospel. The passage of another year is not a result of God forgetting to return, but rather His desire to see all men repent and believe the Gospel. "The Lord is not slow to fulfill His promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance" (2 Peter 3:9). In our annual celebration of the Reformation God again places in front of our eyes the treasures of the Gospel.

As in previous years it is easy to tie this year's remembrance in with a focus on stewardship, and there is an obvious connection here. Biblical stewardship grows naturally out justification. When you realize how much God has done for you in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, your perspective on the things of this world changes. The things of this world are not evil, but the inclinations of our hearts are. Apart from God's grace, our lives, our time, and our possessions only become tools for self-centeredness. Because of the blood of Jesus, however, God's gifts to us become tools for proclaiming the content of the Reformation (God's work of justification by grace alone through faith alone on account of Christ alone).

Thus, Reformation, stewardship, and evangelism are all bound together. A life transformed by the knowledge of the Gospel leads one to invest in the growth of God's Kingdom with one's time, talent, and treasures. You cannot divide the Gospel into hermetically sealed compartments. True knowledge creates a desire to see the church thrive, and for the Church to thrive she must have (humanly speaking) the necessary resources to proclaim the Gospel.

This sounds a lot like what the Small Catechism teaches us to confess about the Second Petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Thy kingdom come." We pray that God would "give us His Holy Spirit so that we believe His Word and lead godly lives as members of His kingdom of grace" AND that He would "use us to extend His kingdom of grace." When you pray the Lord's Prayer, you are asking God to make you a good steward so that the Church might grow.

The treasures of the Reformation are summarized well in the main argument for the Lutherans in June of 1530, when they appeared before the emperor of the Holy Roman Empire.

In Article IV of the Augsburg Confession they confessed what the Gospel is: "Furthermore, it is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work, or satisfactions, but that we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith when we believe that Christ has suffered for us and that for his sake our sin is forgiven and righteousness and eternal life are given to us."

Now that's something worth celebrating!

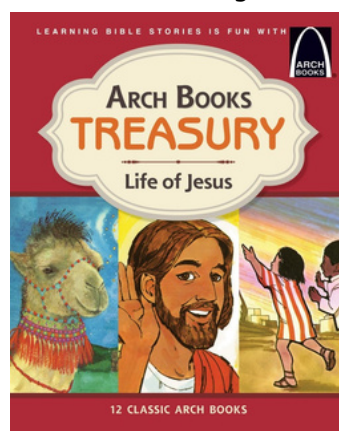

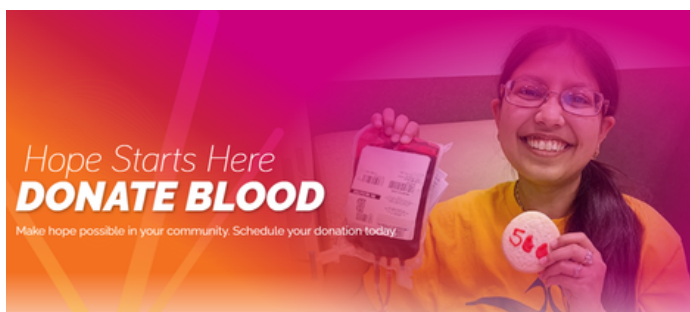

Singing the Faith at Schola Cantorum Camp

Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Milwaukee



Each summer, Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Milwaukee welcomes children from the congregation, its day school, and the surrounding community to Schola Cantorum Camp. Named for the Latin expression meaning "singer's school," the weeklong camp gives new choristers an introduction to choir life and graduating singers one final summer celebration.

Each day begins with Morning Prayer. Rehearsals and sectionals help the children prepare music, while theology and music-theory classes deepen their understanding of the faith they sing. Afternoon activities on and off campus give choristers opportunities to build friendships and strengthen their life together. Choir alumni return to assist, encourage younger singers, and revisit cherished memories. The week culminates in Mount Olive's Sunday Divine Service, where the choir serves the liturgy and supports the proclamation of the Gospel.

Schola Cantorum is open to children ages 8–14 and sings approximately 10–12 services each year. Learn more through [Mount Olive's church music page](#) or email stephen.rosebrock@mtolivemke.org. Thirty Years of Gospel Ministry through Evangelische Andacht



In the 1950s, refugees from eastern Germany and other Eastern European countries settled in Milwaukee after fleeing the Soviet army at the end of World War II. Rev. Eberhard Klatt of Bethany Lutheran Church faithfully served these new neighbors, conducting German-language services into the late 1990s.

As increasing numbers became unable to attend worship, Rev. Klatt launched Evangelische Andacht (Evangelical Devotion) in 1996. Thirty years later, the radio ministry continues proclaiming Christ to thousands of listeners. Although Rev. Klatt is now with the Lord, Rev. Don Hougard of Benediction Lutheran Church carries on the program with Scripture, a devotional message in German and English, and German hymns.

Evangelische Andacht airs Saturdays at 4:30 p.m. on WJOI, 1340 AM or 98.7 FM, and through the TuneIn app. [Benediction also offers German worship](#), generally on the third Sunday of each month. Learn more at evangelischeandacht.org. Please pray that listeners will continue receiving the Gospel, share the broadcast with a German-speaking neighbor, and consider supporting this enduring ministry.

LEAVE THE LEAVES!

When fall arrives, many of us grab a rake and bag up fallen leaves without thinking twice. But did you know that those crunchy piles are more than yard waste? They're also winter homes for pollinators! The leaves in your yard could be sheltering next spring's butterflies, bees, and even fireflies!

For many insects, leaf litter acts like a cozy blanket. It insulates against cold and moisture, giving them a safe place to survive the winter. Bees, butterflies, and moths all take shelter in ways you might not expect:

- Bees in the ground: Many bumble bees, sweat bees, and mining bees dig down into soil and rely on leaf cover for insulation.
- Bees in stems: Most small carpenter bees, mason bees, and leafcutter bees nest inside hollow or pithy plant stems, sometimes sealing themselves in until spring.
- Butterflies and moths: Many species overwinter as chrysalises, cocoons, caterpillars or eggs tucked among leaves, stems, or twigs, quietly waiting until warmer days.

Book Discussion Group: Thursday, October 15 at 9:30 a.m. in the BAAC is the date, time, and setting for our next discussion of the book, **"Theo of Golden"** written by Allen Levi. This book has had a huge impact on many readers. This is what author and lecturer, Donna Snow wrote about this book. "My new favorite read: "Theo of Golden." It is a beautiful story of ordinary people who give when it costs them something and the unexpected way God meets them in it. I've heard people raving about it and they were absolutely right."

This is a fictional book about Theo a wealthy quiet man who moves to Golden, a southern town, stopping at a coffee shop. At this shop, there are 92 penciled drawings of individuals. This Intrigues Theo, who buys all of the drawings with the goal to meet with each person and give to each one of them the drawing of that person. The story takes place in one year – from spring to spring, revealing each person's private story. Throughout these many stories, we can see how God has played a big part in their lives.

Recurring threads in the story are the characters, the coffee shop owners, the artist, a young cellist, and others gradually connect into a portrait of the entire community of Golden.
